Dr R Steward in the new Surgery

MILTON DOCTOR'S SURGERY

We are very pleased to welcome Dr Cain Hunt to Milton Surgery to join Dr Steward. Cain trained at Addenbrookes Hospital and did his GP training locally in Huntingdon. He is married with two small children, one born since joining the practice, and his wife is also a GP.

The surgery has increased in size recently, taking over the bottom half of the next door house which was previously Dr Drapers. This is for a period of three years and during this time a new site for conversion, or the building of new premises and private funding to build will have to be found - any suggestions? Since April 1993 no government funding is available for this purpose.

It is our intention to make the morning surgeries appointments only, bookable on the day to cut down waiting

times. Appointments in the afternoon and evening surgeries will still be bookable in advance.

We now have regular Asthma, Diabetic and Well Women clinics as well as Minor Surgery sessions. Travel vaccinations, family planning and all our other services remain unchanged. We are hoping to start a Child Health Clinic now we have the extra room.

We are in the process of introducing a computer, a new fax machine and several new telephone lines to improve our accessibility.

The surgery will continue to open from 8.00 am to 12.00 noon but we will close a half hour earlier at 6.00 pm from January 1st. An emergency Saturday morning surgery starting at 11.00 am will now occur on a weekly basis.

If you have any suggestions please use the suggestion box in the surgery or talk to one of the staff in person.

The Hospice held its 8th Annual Craft Fair in the Community Centre on Sunday, 24th October.


This popular event attracted large crowds from the time that the doors were first opened.
