Milton Employs Community Care Warden

Milton Parish Council have recently set up a scheme to help the elderly people in Milton who are in need of care, to live comfortably in their own home as long as possible. They have appointed Mrs Trudie Ching as Community Care Warden who will check the welfare of elderly people and decide if any assistance is necessary. She will help with the collection of pensions, some light housework, if requested, and maybe some shopping or making drinks.

It will cost £1 a week to be a member of this scheme, and the warden would visit on a daily basis. They will be given a record card and details of the Wardens visits will be signed by her.

Mrs Ching has already met quite a few elderly people in the village when she visited the various clubs and organisations who cater for the older folk.



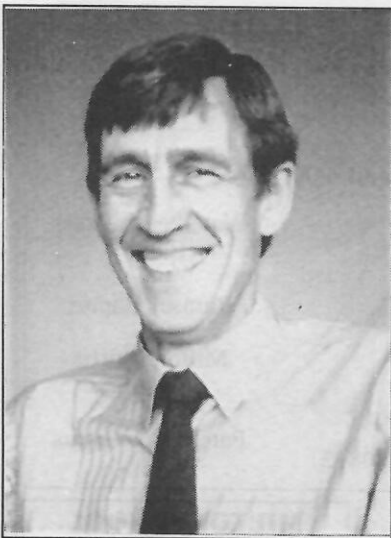

Bogus Callers !

Several people have asked me lately about Bogus Callers and Officials, and what to do if you suspect that a caller at your house may not be genuine.

It is important to remember that most callers are genuine and the chances of receiving a Bogus Caller are very small indeed.

However, if we remember to take the following precautions when answering our doors, we can reduce the chances of letting a Bogus Caller into our homes.

It's called the KNOCK code:-

Know your caller.

Fit a door chain and/or viewer. Use your door viewer or look through a window to see who is there. Before opening the door - put the chain on.

Never allow entry without identification.

Check the callers identity card carefully. Ask them to quote your account number.

Open the door only when you are satisfied that the caller is genuine.

If you are in any doubt ask the caller to come back later when you can have a friend with you. Ring the company to check the callers identity.

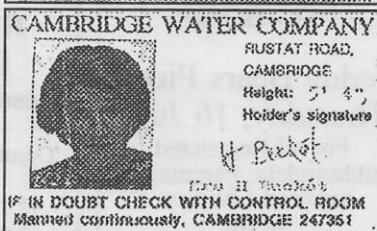
Call the police if you are suspicious.

Shut and keep the door locked and dial the police.

Keep an eye on any caller while they are in the house. Don't leave money lying around in easy reach. Don't hand over cash to anyone you don't know. Don't be too worried - most callers are genuine and will recognise the need for these sensible precautions.

IF IN DOUBT KEEP THEM OUT

The copies of the identity cards have kindly been supplied by the local Electricity and Water Companies and are the sort of thing you can expect genuine callers to carry. (NB: Please don't expect Hilda Bucket to come and fix your water leaks!).



I have spoken to most of the local companies who's representatives are likely to call at your homes. They have all said that they would welcome calls from worried house holders to check the identity of callers.

If you require further information on this or any other crime prevention matter, then please don't hesitate to contact me via Histon Police Station.

Milton Morris are looking forward to another summer of festivals, fetes, gatherings and pub crawls!! Winter practice of glass lifting, beer tasting and some dancing has gone well and we are ready to entertain people at various places both locally and further afield. This is the first year for sometime that we have been able to operate a 'squad' system as we now have eleven members. Only two of these though actually live in Milton so we would welcome new members from the village. If you are 14 years old and upwards come and join us on Monday evenings at 8.00 pm in the small hall at the school.

Our dances this year are all traditional originating from the village of Sherbourne in Gloucestershire. There are 15 dances of which 10 are handkerchief, one is stick and four are solo jigs. The music is by melodeon and the tunes have colourful names such as Orange in Bloom, How d'ye do, The Old Woman Tossed Up and The Cuckoo's Nest. The Milton Crest appears on the back of our waistcoats and our red and blue rosettes, white shirts and trousers and top hats are all traditional as indeed are the bells. The significance of the bells is vague but they do emphasise the rhythm of the steps and were probably used to awaken the earth spirits or perhaps frighten and drive away evil spirits. 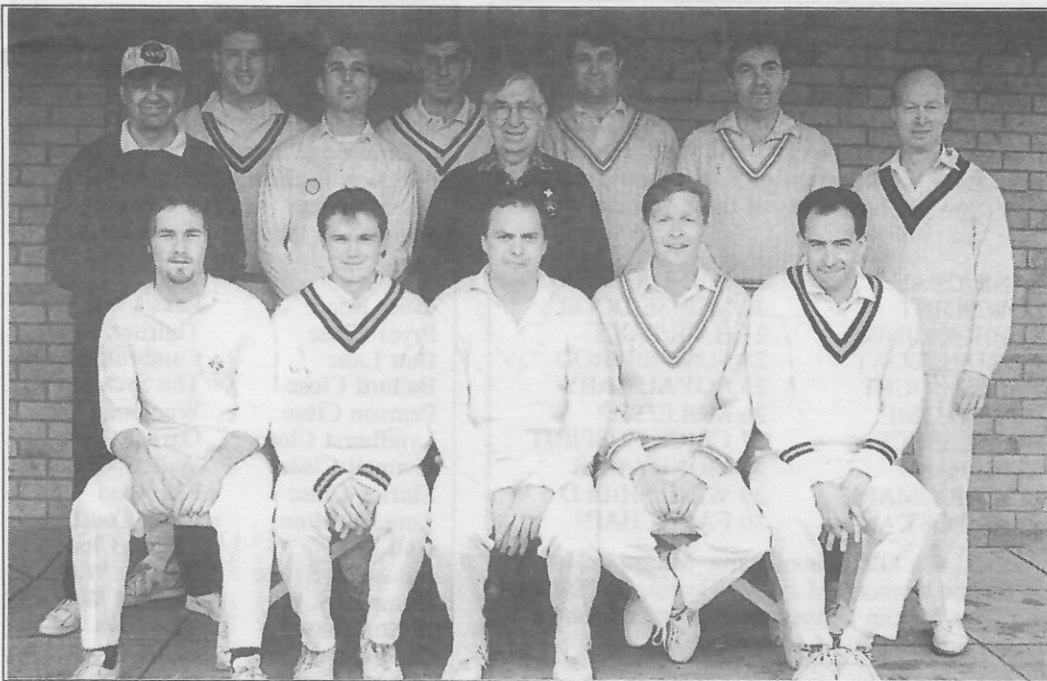
