Iron Age Settlement At Milton

Excavations near the Landfill site at Milton have uncovered an Iron Age settlement. The sites of three houses have been discovered on a gravel ridge with evidence that they were burnt down by the Romans. The gravel had then been excavated by the Romans.

The main dig at present covers an area about the size of a football pitch and finds have included cremation urns with ash and bone fragments.

Also uncovered have been pots of the 1st century known as Colchester ware.

More important finds have been an Iron Age Brooch and Roman coins.

It is known that there was Roman activity in the Milton area and pottery remains and the kilns have been found both in Milton and Horningsca.

Tim Reynolds of the Cambs County Council Archaeology Department is in charge of the dig and has discovered a pond near to the site with Roman pottery remnants. There is strong evidence that a Roman villa is close by and a more extensive dig is planned later in the year. It is hoped that the villa will then be found.

After Michael Green's talk, he and the Rector will be invited to take part in a debate/interview style discussion and hopefully to be able to answer any questions you may like to ask them.

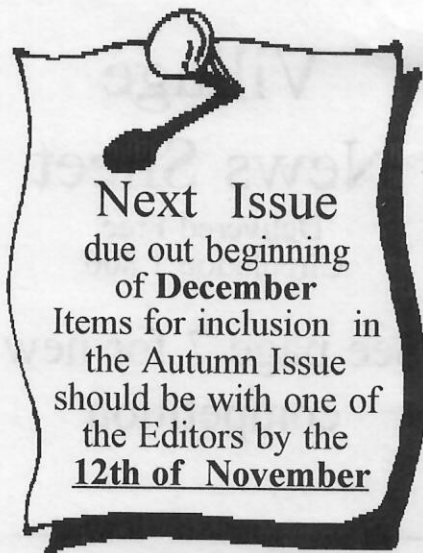
So come along with some good, interesting questions in mind and enjoy what should be a pleasant and unusual way to spend "an alternative bonfire night".



Speeding Motorists

Please take a few minutes to read this article and at the end I will ask you only one question.

Whenever I attend public meetings or when just chatting to people in general, one of the most common complaints is about speeding motor vehicles.

Did you know that if a vehicle travelling at 20 mph hits a child there is a 1 in 20 chance of that child being killed? If the same vehicle travels at 30 mph then the chances of the child being killed are 50/50, but if travelling at 40 mph then forget it, the chances are that the child will die.

Dead children are not just things you read about in the press, it does happen locally, and it CAN happen to you. I have seen dead children that have been killed by speeding vehicles, I have had to deal with the drivers responsible as well as the families of the deceased.

Don't forget that the speed limits are not a target to aim for, they are the absolute maximum speed allowed when, and only when, conditions permit.

The accident might not be your fault, you might be travelling within the lawful limit, but if you are travelling at 40 mph and a child runs out into the road and you hit them, the chances are that you WILL kill that child.

By slowing down just a few miles an hour you can greatly reduce the risk of your killing someone.

If you are caught speeding you will receive penalty points on your driving licence, you may well receive a hefty fine, and it is within the court's powers to disqualify you from driving even if it is your first offence.

With penalty points on your licence, your insurance premium will increase.

It is not unusual for disqualified drivers to lose their jobs for obvious reasons.

If you kill someone whilst driving at a speed considered to be dangerous then you can be sent to prison for up to 10 years.

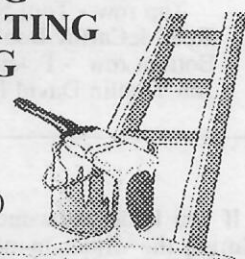
