
A Day's outing from Milton to Felixstowe

A very pleasant time was spent by the members of the Lunch Club, the Enterprise



Would you like to help out? Guides are aged 10-15 years. They do various activities and generally try to have fun. If you would like to help on a regular


basis or you have a craft, hobby or activity you would like to share with the girls please give me a ring.

'Swallows Cafe' courtesy of Edmund House, is now open in the Visitors Centre, providing light refreshments. Opening hours are noon to 5 pm., every day until 1 October, then at

weekends during the winter months.

The 'Friends' now have a range of promotional items for sale, including wildlife checklists, pencils, badges and postcards featuring views of the Park. All are available from the 'Friends' at the information desk in the Visitors Centre.

The 'Friends' are now collecting and recycling aluminium cans as another source of revenue. During the first three months we have raised £51.97. Please start collecting for us, and bring the cans (crushed if possible) to the Visitors Centre.

V J Day 1945 and V J Day 1995

As I watched the V J Day celebrations on television, my thoughts went back 50 years to that momentous day in August 1945, when I heard the news on the radio that at last the war with Japan had ended.

To me, it meant that my husband would be coming home after 2 years in the Far

East, with the Royal Navy, and I was overjoyed.

By the time he eventually did return at the end of 1945, all the celebrations for V J Day were well over. As it was, V J Day 1945 was very quiet and subdued in comparison to VE Day. I can't remember any street parties, where I lived. After all, only a few weeks previously the Atom Bomb had been dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki killing thousands of people and causing terrible devastation. It seemed to me at that time, that mankind finally had the scientific capacity to create his own Armageddon. It was hardly a time to rejoice.

However, when the ex-prisoners of Japanese war camps were released, Liverpool

was one city which made a special effort to welcome them home.

I remember going down to the Pier Head, to join the crowds of flag waving people to greet the men as they came slowly off the troop ships onto Princes Landing Stage. Some were on stretchers, some in wheelchairs or on crutches, some walked with assistance. All of them were extremely emaciated, weak and weary, but obviously very happy to be back in the UK.

They all managed a smile and a cheery wave as they passed us to the waiting

ambulances and buses on the dockside. It was a very harrowing experience to see

the dreadful state of these men. I have never forgotten it.

So it was heart-warming to see so many veterans who fought in the Japanese campaigns, looking so smart as they marched past the Queen on V J Day

This indeed, was their very special day. Iris Chilton

The 'Good Night' Child Sitting Service

The 'Good Night' Service is a voluntary organisation which offers a sitting service to families who have a child with a physical and/or learning disability aged from birth to 19 years old. The Service aims to recruit and train volunteers, aged 16 or over, and match them with families in their own vicinity. On-going support and training is available to volunteers and expenses are reimbursed.

The Service was conceived in 1992 and covers the cities of Cambridge and Ely and the surrounding rural areas. There are currently twenty eight families linked to volunteers and fifteen families waiting to be linked. Unfortunately, 'Good Night' has been unable to accept further referrals over the last year as the number of families requesting the service has far exceeded the number of volunteers recruited.

I am new in post as the Co-ordinator and it is my intention to develop the service as it is clearly a very valuable resource for parents, enabling them to have a break from caring, secure in the knowledge that their child is being

well cared for. In order for 'Good Night' to extend the service to more families it is necessary to recruit many more volunteers. If you would like to support this much needed service and would be able to offer at least one evening per month to a family, please contact me. No experience is necessary, merely a caring and sensitive attitude towards young people with special needs. If you would like to volunteer with a friend or partner or you are interested in befriending a young person with special needs, there are many families who would value your involvement and support in this way.

NEWS FROM OVER 100 YEARS AGO

In January1892 at MILTON the annual CHOIR SUPPER took place in the Rectory dining room. The long and broad table, stretching nearly the whole length of the room, was plentifully supplied with the usual requirements for such an occasion. The time honoured boiled beef and plum pudding were conspicuous by their bulk; these when despatched were succeeded by a variety of fruits and sweets. Altogether 19 sat down including the venerable Rector, who is now in his 89th year, the Rev J E R Polak, Mr. Goodin, the choirmaster and other well known residents; the Rector himself presiding at the head of the table, carving, a prerogative he has enjoyed now for long course of years. A few members of the choir were unavoidably absent. The President was full of life and seemed to enter fully into the spirit of the matter in hand. The guests all partook heartily of their old friends hospitality and very much enjoyed themselves. Each one was expected to sing his own song; accordingly, after supper, the company having increased by the addition of all the members of the household, a musical evening followed. A speech by the Vicar, followed by the National Anthem brought the proceedings to a close.

28 October 1892 RECREATION AND READING ROOM
"On Monday last, a free recreation and reading room, held in the village school room was opened. Mr. C Tweedale who occupied the chair, spoke a few works to the men and lads (some 50 or 60 present) asking them to enjoy themselves and to take care of the games provided for their use and then declared the room open. Mr. Illingworth was thanked for the trouble he had taken in promoting and forming this club and we only wish it will be a success, as there never has been anything in Milton, apart from the public house or village corner, to entertain the men and lads. Funds are urgently needed and books, papers, etc. will be thankfully received by Mr. Illingworth. The room will be open 4 nights weekly, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 6.30 to 9.00 pm. Friday and Saturday the room cannot be obtained. The committee wish to thank the Rev J Chapman for his kindness in lending the room for the four nights."
