## Four Legged Walk

Most of us would not look forward to a thirteen mile walk, even less if our legs were tied to fellow walkers, but that is just what Daryl Kitching, Lynda Molloy and Julia Agg were sponsored to do. On September the 7th they walked from Ely to Milton, a walk which took them six hours arriving at Coles road recreation ground at 3pm with sore feet and aching limbs raising £657.66 for Milton Play Group. The walk started at 9am with Daryl in the middle. Daryl, are you still walking bow legged?

# Steaming through Milton

On the 20th. October at 9.30 pm. The Flying Scotsman no. 4472 probably hauled the last steam passenger train through Milton. Although it was dark the sound and smell of the powerful engine, the sight of sparks and glow of the fire from the fire made it an unforgettable experience.

During this weekend a number of special excursions ran between Kings Lynn and Cambridge. The trains were hauled by a combination of three steam engines Taw Valley, Flying Scotsman and Britannia. Britannia is the only one of the engines to have been used on this line before, that was in 1952 to convey the body of King George VI from Kings Lynn to Kings Cross.

The line from Kings Lynn to Eiy opened in 1847 at a cost of under £3,000 a high cost for those days due to the number of bridges built. When the line has been fully electrified from Cambridge to Kings Lynn the cost will be in excess of £11,000,000. The journey time will be cut from 2 hrs. 20 mins. In the days of steam to 100 mins, for the 99 miles from Kings Lynn to London.

According to BR. steam can seriously damage the overheads, so no more steam trains through Milton. Next summer Network Southeast are planning an "all electric gala day" with special electric locomotives not normally seen in this area to celebrate the new Electric service, but alas no steam!

We look forward to seeing you and you will be sure of a warm welcome from all of our shop



# THE CENSUS THROUGH THE YEARS

In April this year a Census was taken and this continued a practice that has been going on now for nearly 200 years.

The first census or population count in the United Kingdom was taken on the night of 10 March 1801 and a

census has been taken at 10 year intervals ever since, except in 1941.

Earlier attempts to take a census failed mainly because of religious opposition and the returns for the first four censuses were destroyed when the analysis work had been finished. Even for the 1841 census some enumerators asked for police protection. This 1841 census is the earliest for which complete details can be seen.

The 1841 census does not show street or house names nor was the relationship given of the people in the house to the head of the household. Marital status was not shown nor birthplace other than if it occured in the county or not. Ages were rounded down to the nearest multiple of 5 although exact ages were given for children under 15.

House names and numbers as well as streets were shown in the census taken on 30 March 1851. In addition the returns also give the relationship of every person in the house to the head, their marital status, age, rank, profession or occupation and birthplace. They even indicate whether a person was blind, deaf or dumb.

This pattern was followed for the censuses of 7 April 1861 and 2 April 1871. For 3 April 1881 an additional

column was used to indicate if a person was an imbecile, idiot or lunatic!

All census forms have contained an undertaking that the returns will remain confidential for 100 years but information can be released from the censuses up to 1911 by the Registrar General upon written request. However, the last census which is freely open for examination is that for 1881. The 1891 census will be available from 1 January 1992.

The census shows that the village population of 273 males and 281 females lived in 125 houses. About

190 people lived in the High Street, and about 170 in Fen End (as Fen Road was called in 1881).

The Smith family lived in Garment Lane - a location which has now disappeared.

The most numerous family names in 1881 were Coulson (there where 9 families with this name) Brown, Burton, Burler, Day, Easy, Froment, Goodin, Payton, Wilson and Wolfe - some of these names are commemorated in current Street names and some descendants are still living in the village.

Milton Hall was occupied by a widower Charles Giles who was a native of Clapham, Surrey and described as a 'Clergyman without care of souls'.

The Rector was 77 year old John Chapman who had held this living for 35 years by then. The census records his wife Margaret as being deaf.

Most people in Milton in 1881 earned their living from the land and it is unusual to see that John Blackburn

Is listed as a Sculptor and his son Louis as a Carver in Wood.

There are 6 Publicans listed but the names of the Pubs are not given. Five of the Pubs would be 'The White Horse', 'The Lion & Lamb', 'The Three Tuns', 'The Greyhound' and 'The Jolly Brewers' - the sixth is a mystery

Coprolite digging is given as the occupation of several men. Coprolite is the fossilised dung of extinct animals which was used as manure. The digging was likely to have been carried on in Fen Road.

The post of Toll keeper had disappeared by 1881 - the coming of the railways had caused a disastrous

drop in toll charges and the toll houses had been sold off a few years earlier.

## NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

YOUTH CLUB
