On June 12th, we travelled to the Brandon area, where we observed wildlife at dusk. We saw a variety of birds, including a nightjar, in classic pose, laying prone along the dead branch of a pine tree, silhouetted against a darkening sky.

On July 19th, we travelled to Devils Dyke to see summer flowers of the chalk grassland. Many species were identified including two types of orchid, one unfortunately past its best!

During the summer months, a display of some of the work in the Park has been exhibited at the Natural History Society Convention in Cambridge, the Feast Market on Histon Green, and the Village Fayre in Milton.

In July, we held two evening sessions on first aid. This gave our members an introduction, and in some cases a reminder, about basic steps in an emergency, whether in the Park, in the home or elsewhere.

We are almost at the end of a cricketing season in which the teenage groups of the Colts will have played 31 games. There is a general wish to go on playing while the weather is so good but the early onset of the football season has caused us to curtail our activities.

The long term plan to revitalise the Colts section of Milton Cricket Club was, in the view of the Colts' Committee, initially dependent on the establishment of a corpus of young players who enjoyed and wanted to play

enjoyed and wanted to play cricket. This, in varying degrees we have done, and what follows is a description or report on the growth that has taken place at the Colt's end of the club this season.

From the squad that the Club had in 1995 only about ten boys were eligible or inclined to play for Milton Colts in 1996. Since the plan was to field three teams of Colts this year some serious recruiting was needed. John Clough, a committee member, approached the Lord's Taverners for an extra kit for the Under Il's; this arrived just as the season started! For the production of recruiting circulars (as well as much subsequent literature) the Club must be grateful to Lorraine Newton, who, though a busy person, showed the kind of loyalty which should merit its own success. The same thing can be said of Bob Newton, who, two months later took the boys to the field for match after match with very little success. It was what I had expected as I had seen it the previous season, but it must have been dispiriting for Bob and Lorraine. Things got a little better later (we won three of those 31 matches, though there were others that were close).

However the recruitment campaign made it possible to establish three squads and play teams in the under ll's, under l3's and under l5's. By the end of the season we have accumulated 46 possible Colts players (one of these a girl, Mollie Abraham, an under ll who takes her cricket seriously and is therefore becoming skilled). This number was swelled in the last few weeks by a number of 14 - 15 year old Milton boys who made it possible to play under l5's matches without borrowing too heavily from lower age groups.

The under l1 Colts number 14, ten of whom live in Milton. The under 13's number 20, twelve of whom live in Milton.

The under 15's number 12, six of whom live in Milton.

As can be seen there is a healthy predominance of Milton children, increasingly so towards the younger end of the Colts. Next season most of the under ll's will be of an age to be playing the under l3's; the recruiting of under ll's must go on each year, but not necessarily for the older groups. In a year or two the percentage of Milton children in the Colts will be over 80%, a natural succession. There is, however, some concern that when our boys become too old for the Colts they will find it difficult to secure a place in the third men's team; a fourth men's ex-Colts team has been suggested.

Finally our money matters have been taken over by Bob Pain an under ll's parent who works in banking. He is concerned that both trainers, managers and boys (or girls)

should be covered against accident while playing cricket.

So forming the Milton Colts continues; the season is over and we can turn our minds to the funding of the training facilities, until now there has not been time! Towards the end of the season one or two senior players came and did some coaching of the boys in the nets, integration is therefore slowly taking place - the Milton Colts are beginning!
