
Interviews are taking place at the present time for a new Community Care Warden and I hope it will not be too long before this successful scheme is in operation again.



Armistice Day 1996

My husband and I much appreciated the organisation by Milton Parish Council of a dignified and moving Ceremony of Rememberance Milton War Memorial on Armistice

Chairman of the Parish Council, Robert Waters, laid a wreath of poppies, on behalf of Milton people, and the reading of the verse by Frank Burling starting with "They shall grow not old, as we who are left grow old" after the 2 minutes silence, ended the ceremony.

As I stood there my thoughts went back to the Second World War and I remembered many of my friends who died 'In Action' or in Air-raids on the

city where I lived.

I remembered 50 years back when on Armistice Day 1946 my eldest daughter was born, and I thought that she and her contemporaries have much to be grateful, to the people who survived the war. These are the people who had the determination to make sure their children would enjoy a better world than they knew when they were young. Many of them lived through the years of depression in the 1930's, when unemployment, poverty, poor housing and poor health was far worse than it is today.

They worked hard to ensure the next generation had a better education, better health, better food and clothing than they had, and I sometimes think they deserve more respect and consideration in their old age, than society affords them today.

My three eldest grandchildren are now older than I was in World War Two, and I am thankful they have enjoyed the benefits of a better standard of living and a good education. I only hope they can help in some way to solve some of the world's continuing problems for the good of all.



Welcome Home From Hospital

A new hospital discharge scheme based at Addenbrooke's Hospital is currently being set up. The scheme, which is managed by Care Network with joint funding from Health and Social Services, will offer short-term practical support to elderly people with no immediate care available on discharge from hospital.

The scheme will not replace any statutory services but will complement them by providing a stop-gap until other services commence or until the person feels able to cope again. Initially, the scheme will cover patients living within a 10 mile radius of Addenbrooke's but will be extended in the future if successful.

The success of the scheme depends solely on the volunteers providing the service so volunteers are now being sought urgently. Applications are welcomed from people with or without their own transport and all expenses will be reimbursed.

No particular skills are needed - just a caring nature, common sense and a genuine liking for older people. The time commitment for each client is likely to be approximately an hour a day for an average of 2 to 3 days which will involve simple tasks such as warming the house, making a hot drink or light meal, shopping etc. How frequently a volunteer is called upon will depend on the size of the area that particular volunteer is prepared to cover.

Our Supervisor, Rosemary Miller, who has supported the Committee throughout all the planning and preparation required for the Voucher scheme and has been able to use her vast experience in Pre-Schools to great effect, is sadly leaving us at Christmas. I am sure she will be missed by a lot of Village families. The Committee and I wish to thank her for her hard work and support, and wish her well in her

new job.

Special Fruit Cake Recipe (From the Albram Patients Group Newsletter)

Ingredients


