



Ponds are an interesting part of the landscape but have disappeared at an alarming rate over the last century. This New Pond booklet celebrates a wealth of local history and wildlife associated with ponds around Cambridge and suggests a few of the best to visit. There is a chapter with information on pond management and advice.

Written by The Cambridge Green Belt Project it costs £1.50 including post and packing. Cheques should be made payable to the "Wildlife Trust".

Mere Way

This is one of the few country footpaths in our village, a Roman Road running north and south of Butt Lane from the Mere Way Poultry Farm. The Cambridge Green Belt Project will be organising clearance work to provide a path for pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders, about 2-3m wide, on the days listed below.

All cut material will be stacked on site in dense scrub to rot down as habitat piles. It is hoped to restore the wide sheltered but sunny pathway which will encourage butterflies, other insects and many birds. Local people are very welcome to join work parties and are positively encouraged to visit the site when work is under way.

The middle dates are during half term; children are also welcome, but under 14's please bring an adult with you!



The Winter Wildlife in the Park has had a hard time at the start of 1997. The cold weather, and lack of natural food, takes its toll. If it is still cold by the time you read this, I urge you to supplement their food by putting scraps out in your garden, and maybe visiting the Park and feeding any spare bread to the water fowl.

Whilst on the subject of the cold weather, even more frightening has been the number of people, both adults and children, walking and cycling on the ice

covered lakes. Some even encouraging their dogs on to the ice. Despite all the warning notices, and items in the press, still some appear to think 'It will not happen to me!' Please parents make sure you know what your children are up to. Remember the water is very cold, and deep in places, don't put your life at risk, or the lives of potential rescuers.

Planting has begun in the Sensory Garden, and our target to raise £1,000 for this project was reached just before Christmas. Thank you to all of you who gave so generously. The date for the opening of the 'Garden', sometime this Spring, will be publicised on the Park and Parish notice boards.

In addition to the Volunteer Working Parties each month, the 'Friends' hold Working Parties on the second Tuesday, and the third Saturday every month, starting at 9 am. Why not join us and help in the maintenance of the Sensory Garden and the Nursery, etc.

We would also be pleased to hear from anyone who could spare a few hours each month to staff the Information Desk in the Visitor Centre. We hope to be open on weekdays, as well as weekends from Easter to October this year.


The "Art in the Dark" evening brought together a hundred or more candle lit lanterns, made by local primary school children to light an area of the




