Impington Village College Mourns Sad Loss of Warden

Dr. Sylvia West, Warden of Impington Village College, Cambridge, who died suddenly after a short illness, on February 13th at the tragically early age of 51 was that rare combination of noted philosopher and successful practitioner. Her funeral was held at the Cambridge Crematorium at 4.30pm on 21st of Feb. and attended by friends, staff and governors of the College. During her time at IVC, Dr. West, in partnership with the Local Education Authority (LEA), introduced a workplace nursery, negotiated the introduction of a special needs department for the physically disabled and supported the efforts which raised £500 000 to find a new indoor swimming people

which raised £500,000 to fund a new indoor swimming pool. Sylvia West had been the Warden at Impington Village

College for eleven years and will be sadly missed.


At this sad time governors, with the support of the LEA, have had to go forward and advertise the position of Warden in the hope that an appointment can be made for September.



Sheltered Housing in Milton

• There is a proposal to build self contained rented sheltered accommodation, which would be supported by a warden living on site.

• The scheme, of about 25 units, would be for elderly people, from Milton and the

surrounding area.

• Milton is the only large village in South Cambridgeshire without sheltered housing.

· At present people in Milton requiring support in their old age have to move away from the village.

Over the years serious consideration has been given to building sheltered housing on sites at Fen Road; Milton Hall; Butt Lane; The Rowans and The Sycamores. The viability of these sites has been explored with South Cambridgeshire District Council Planners, but for various reasons they have been discounted. On 5th December 1994 the Parish Council agreed to ask South Cambs. District Council to investigate the use of part of Coles Road Recreation Ground adjacent to the hardcourts. Although the site has a number of advantages, there are some disadvantages to be resolved before a scheme can be approved.

If the scheme is to go ahead it is important to know your opinion.

Friends Of Milton Country Park

First of all, a big thank you to everybody who helped the wildlife in the Park during the 'freeze up' at the beginning of the year. The water fowl especially enjoyed a large amount of donated food, not least from farmer Robin CHAPMAN with his generous donation of potatoes.

Now as I write, Spring has arrived (I think). Anyway, there are snowdrops in the Park and the birds appear to be pairing up and deciding where to start building nests for the coming year.

Speaking of nests, the 'Friends' took part in the British Trust for Ornithology campaign - 'Britain Needs More Holes' - the first of what is hoped to be an annual event. This was advertised as National Nest Box Week, running from 14th - 21st February. We chose Sunday the 16th for our nest box making day. After gloriously sunny days on the Friday and Saturday, Sunday started dull and by the time the event started 12.00 noon, it started to drizzle.

All our materials were purchased at a very competitive price from Travis Perkins, and U.K. Plant Hire lent us a circular saw to cut the timber to the correct lengths for the 'kits' before the day. Our grateful thanks to both firms concerned. Twenty four families came into our 'workshop' during the afternoon and assembled 'tit' and 'open' boxes. Most were taken home, but a few left for erection in the Park, for which we thank those concerned very much.

If you were not able to attend, we still have boxes for sale in the Centre, either in kit form or ready made. The cost in either case is £5.00, £2.00 of which will be sent to the B.T.O.

Just a reminder or two. Firstly the 'Friends' have a range of memorabilia for sale in the Visitor Centre. We also sell bird food at very competitive prices. If you feed the birds in your garden and are unable to get to the Park, I would be pleased to supply, cash on delivery, anywhere in Milton. Just give me a ring on Cambridge 515750.

Secondly, watch out for the date of the Sensory Garden opening. It is hoped that it will be towards the end of May, and notices will be erected in the Park and around the village.





Volunteer Sitters Needed

The 'Good Night' Service is a voluntary organisation which offers a sitting service to families who have a child with a physical and/or learning disability aged from birth to 19 years old. The Service aims to recruit volunteers, aged 16 or over, and match them with families in their own vicinity. going support and training is available to volunteers and expenses are reimbursed.

The Service was conceived in 1992 and covers the cities of Cambridge and Ely and the surrounding rural areas. Minutes of 50 Years Ago

Parish Council Minutes, 25th Feb 1937 A discussion on Village Colleges took place and opinion was definitely against them. It was resolved that a halt should be called in the building of Village Colleges to see if those already built justify their expenditure. It was recommended that, if a College is built, it should be at Cottenham rather than Impington because in the latter case, Milton children would be forced to cycle the arduous journey to Impington, a very cruel procedure in the wind, rain and fog, whilst the Cottenham site was far enough away for the Education Committee to have to provide buses.



Did you know the Mobile Library visits Milton every week? It is free to join and there is no charge for the loan of books.

You can borrow novels and information books, large print books, children's board books, picture books, stories and information books.
