This year's event raised the wonderful sum of £2,600 for the Cancer Care Unit at Addenbrookes as well as £200 for the Day Centre and £100 for the Lunch Club.

In fact over the twelve years of the Craft Fayre a total of £38,775 has been raised for good causes. From 1985 - 1994 the Craft Fayre raised £30,000 for the Milton Hospice and in 1995, £3,025 was raised for the McMillan Nurses. In 1996 £2,600 was raised for MAGPAS, £100 for the Day Care Centre, £100 for the Lunch Club and £50 for the Sensory Garden.

All this has been made possible by the dedicated efforts of Jean Bowyer and Tina Barker who after twelve years of organizing this huge event have decided to take a well earned rest whilst they decide what to do next.




Brian Ogden talking to Class 3

Netball

During the last half-term the school football team has been trained by one of the Cambridge United players and this has enhanced their team spirit. On a weekly basis he has trained a group of 30 children from Years 4, 5 and 6 and taught them the rudimentary skills of being a footballer. Already they are gelling into a team and are ready to face their first match which will be before Christmas, weather permitting. All the children benefited from these sessions and the school are hoping to repeat the exercise in the near future to the benefit of school football.

My School Days

When one looks at Milton School of to-day, the size of it, the numerous class rooms, and lovely big hall, one wonders how any of us made it to adulthood, parenthood, and owned our own houses but we did, and did it very well I would say. We never heard so much about A levels and University as at present, trying for these high grades must be hard. Our School was built in 1836 and closed in 1958. It was situated in Fen Road, there was one little room with a coal fire for the infants, with a little porch with pegs for coats, there was a sliding door into the big room, where there were two classes, with pipes all round the bottom of the wall, you were lucky if you sat near them, there was a wooden built cloakroom and a smaller one. The toilets were out of this world, not the sort you would want to sit in for long, but the children did congregate in them as I remember. One small play ground, and the front one a bit larger. There was also a stoke hole, where the fire was lit to heat the pipes. I did not really enjoy my school days, but then again I did not dislike them. I think I tolerated them.

If any one who went to school in those days, thinks I have got it all wrong please put a bit in the next Village View.

Street Light Repairs

"Most street lights in New* Cambridgeshire are owned and maintained by the County Council, but some remain the direct responsibility of Parish and District Councils. All illuminated signs are maintained by the County Council.

Regardless of ownership all reports can be made to one freephone telephone number 0800 25 35 29.

Each light or sign is supposed to have a black-on-white number, which you should report with the street in which the faulty light is located.

If the report is for a light which is not looked after by the County Council details will be passed on to the appropriate Parish, Town, City or District Council. The County Council maintains a total of 55,000 street lights, illuminated traffic signs and bollards.

Extracts from The Story So Far:-

Other developments

It is widely acknowledged that school age children are sold approximately £108 million worth of cigarettes per year, yet it has been illegal to do so since 1908.

The Government has made a pledge to ban the advertising of tobacco products and sports sponsorship.

In 1996, Guernsey became the first place in the UK to impose a ban on advertising, as part of a package of tobacco measures. Guernsey also raised the legal age of sale of cigarettes from 16 to 18 years.

Achievements

The target set for the proportion of supermarkets and petrol stations was met, 34 being awarded in the district.

18 complaints have been registered by Trading Standards.

Approximately 30 requests for further information from national organisations have been met.
