

Editors reply to Mary Daniels account of her school days

Mary's article in the last issue of the Village View describing her school days in Milton brought back memories of my school in a Liverpool suburb in the 1920's.

Mary and I recently compared notes about those far off days, and realised our school days were very similar. My school was also built at the beginning of the last century and was never

modernised in any way.

It was constructed of corrugated iron and had a tiny playground of black cinders. The class rooms were painted a dreary dark green or brown and were lit by gas lamps.

They were heated by water pipes at the back of the room and were never adequate in cold weather.

The toilets at the back of the school playground were constantly blocked up, and in winter were frozen for days on end.

The basics of Reading, Writing and Arithmetic were taught, but little else. Discipline was harsh and punishments were given for the least thing. The boys got the cane, but the girls were just humiliated by being made to kneel in front of the class, with hands on top of the head, for at least half an hour. I don't remember ever feeling happy at school.

I think my generation, who were born just after the First World War, missed out on many things people enjoy today, and a good education was one of them, unless you came from an affluent family background.

Still it is never too late to learn new skills and over the past 18 years since I retired at 60, I have been to numerous classes to study Art, Calligraphy, Lace making and English Language and English Literature at 'O Level' among others and thoroughly enjoyed it, so maybe, I haven't missed out after all.

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School Memories of Milton Past

I received this letter from Edith Bullman (nee King), who now lives in Sutton.

I am 85 years old. My mother brought her 4 daughters to Milton to be near her husband who was in the army, and who died in 1918. Our house was squeezed between two bigger ones and was right opposite the school. In those days the girls playground, which we shared with the infants, was at the back of the school, surrounded by a wall, with just a gate separating it from the boys playground, which was much bigger. The only real exercises we girls had was on cold days, and that was just Arms up, Arms down, Forward and Sideways. If too wet to go out, the girls had to stay in the infants room, when we would often play with the sand trays that the infants used for learning to write. That was before they had slates. They had straws, which we blew through, making patterns.

There was a pot-bellied stove which was near the mistress's desk. Only one teacher for that room, which was also used for sewing and knitting classes. A wide glass door separated that room from the main room, which was about twice as long. One teacher for the up to 10 years, although in those days you were moved on according to your work and not ages. That teacher, a lady, had a small cane and used it. The Headmaster, a Mr Ballard, taught the 11-14 years old. His was a bigger cane, often used on the boys. I remember on one occasion how awed we all were, when he was caning an older boy (approaching the leaving age of 14). The boy grabbed the stick and broke it in halves. The master sent another boy to the school house for another one. The big boy stood up to him, so the stick wasn't used on him any more.

We girls had our hoops and skipping ropes to play, other games too, like hopscotch, etc. The boys, their tops and marbles. and plenty of rough games.

I remember too, the master asking my mother if he could cane my younger sister as he thought she had deliberately failed her 11-plus exam, getting a very firm No! We had to travel to Waterbeach infant school to sit for our 11+. I remember too, how jealous I felt when we were drawing maps, as only the boys were allowed coloured pencils for outlines etc.

Edith Bullman has also sent us a drawn plan of the old school layout which we hope to publish in our next issue.

From Ray Daniels:

I can remember the open air toilets; the playground at the front was virtually the same size as the school. The school had a plaque on the front with the date it was built, which I think was 1837. The small back playground overlooked Mr Easy's field at the now houses (Old School Lane? Ed), and it also led into the school house

backyard - my grandparents' house. This yard had an apple tree and the apples could be used either for cooking or eating. The European Union would have them banned now, I'm sure. In fact this sort of apple is not sold now. I am still too young to know if they were sold then. The entrance to the main part of the school had a cloakroom and there was another bit that had a place to wash your hands. In other words somewhere for a sink. It was an honour to be a milk monitor and ring up, I think it was Chivers, to order how many bottles of milk were required. Black phones that we used then are probably in museums now or used as memorabilia by some people. I can remember Mrs. Thoday, Miss Sutcliffe and a Mrs. Higginbottom as teachers. Two of these have now since died. The school had about 30+ children ranging from 5-11. Miss Sutcliffe suffered terribly from asthma, perhaps one of the earliest to suffer from the effects of pollution? She had a car; could have been an Austin, (I'm not sure, but its number plate was DVB1. What price would that fetch now?) This was the equivalent of the school minibus; only 3 or 4 went on a trip at one time, and then only the 'top juniors'. The school windows were of a similar style to church windows only without the stained glass.







The Dogs (Fouling of land) Act 1996

This is the public notice which appeared in the local press on 12.12.97 as the law requires. We are reprinting it for your information and consideration as it will apply to Milton. Please note the sections marked by asterisks.

SOUTH CAMBRIDGESHIRE DISTRICT COUNCIL

THE DOGS (FOULING OF LAND) ACT 1996 SOUTH CAMBRIDGESHIRE DISTRICT COUNCIL FOULING OF LAND BY DOGS ORDER 1998 NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the South Cambridgeshire District Council propose to make an order designation under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 any land which is open to the air (if it is open on at least one side) and to which the public are entitled or permitted to have access (with or without payment) EXCEPT

land in or alongside a highway where the speed limit is more than 40mph;

land used for agriculture or for woodlands; 2

land which is predominantly marshland, moor and heath; and

common land to which the public are entitled or permitted to have access over otherwise than by virtue of section 193(1) of the Law of Property Act 1925 (right of access to urban common land).

The effect of the order is to create an offence if a dog defecates at any time on designated land and a person who is in charge of the dog at that time fails to remove the faeces from the land forthwith.

Donald Pearson 1917 - 1998

The death of Donald Pearson aged 80 of Fen Farm, Fen Road was announced in January. Don was born and bred in Milton. He married Iris, daughter of a prominent Milton farmer Mr William Hall of Willow Farm (now Ambassador Lodge next to the Waggon & Horses) in 1938 - they were 3 months short of their 60th anniversary

After the second World War Don helped reform Milton Football Club and played for a few years and was also Treasurer and President. Both he and Iris served on the Parish Council for many years - Don was chairman for 12 years from 1963 - 75. It is interesting to note that one member of today's Council also served at the same time as Don.

Although Don retired from active 'politics" over 20 years ago he still kept a lively interest in village life and continued to farm with his son Bertram. The fact that the church was packed for his funeral is an indication of the affection many people from the "older" part of Milton had for him.

Colts News

In November the Colts had their own Trophy Night for the first time. It was held in the Community Centre which seemed the right place for thirty or more children and their families. John and Phyllis Sandford are to be congratulated for the catering and the rest of the Colts Committee for their administration.

Anne Giri donated a silver cup which will go to the 'Colt of the year', a trophy which will always stand for commitment to the club. Harry Capitain, Sports Editor and President of the Cricket Club gave out the prizes; there were some trophies for skills but most of the prizes were for commitment.

That lack of success is likely to change in the next few seasons, for the week before

Christmas a letter from the Foundation for Sports and the Arts arrived (we have waited fourteen months for this) and informed us that they were prepared to grant Milton CC Colts Development Fund £10,000. What a Christmas present! This brings our total up to around £19,000. Our original target being £23,000.

Most of this money will go to pay for three practice nets and an all-weather pitch. Some money has already been spent on equipment and paying for indoor training time and sending people on coaching courses. In January four club members will have started a full coaching course, which is even better news than the grant, but of course the Colts have always needed both. What we need now is four more coaches, then everyone can do a stint without being overstretched; there is such a thing as 'burn-out', teaching with enthusiasm is more tiring than playing the sport itself!

We will soon be embarking on our winter training and I will inform you of the times and places for different age-groups. If your child wants to play cricket and is over seven phone me and I will send you an enrolment form; but it must be remembered that if your child becomes a colt you automatically take on some responsibility for helping to run their activities. But we do want more youngsters, and girls just as much as boys!

Some parents may not have been used to cricket themselves but if your child fancies playing you should encourage him/her. Belonging to the colts section of a cricket club teaches many things besides physical skills (not in themselves to be sniffed at), it teaches patience, loyalty and fair-mindedness, it encourages determination; all theses are qualities that are, if we are being honest, much more desirable than academic qualifications. Of course you might be lucky and your child could be both, they are not mutually exclusive.

So we need another £4,000 before the season starts, not such a big problem. But I would like some help. A new brochure will have been prepared by the time you read this which sets out the whole case for helping swell the Colts Development Fund. I am worried that when we get all these facilities they will be taken for granted. So perhaps someone who reads this would be prepared to take a brochure to a source of money. There is so little distance to go before we achieve our aim. Wishing you all a Happy New Year.
