Milton Primary School in Butt Lane will now be able to celebrate not only forty years but a great fortieth year as the school is presented with an excellent OFSTED report. In that report the Office for Standards in Education (OFSTED) praised headteacher Tom Gillmore, his staff and the governing body, as well as the quality of teaching and the behaviour of pupils. "Milton Primary School is a very good school with many positive features and some significant strengths," said the inspectors' report. They highlighted pupils' behaviour in and around the school as "exemplary" and added that the quality of pupils' personal development was excellent. By the end of Key Stage 2, the pupils' attainment is well above national expectations in English, mathematics and science.

Inspectors described the governors as a well informed body with a thorough understanding of their responsibilities. "They conduct themselves efficiently and are rigorous in their approach."

Chairman of Governors John Harradine said "I am delighted that the Report has confirmed our view that the school provides our children with such a good education. I would particularly like to thank the Headteacher and all his staff for their hard work and commitment over many years."







Dear Mr Hickford



In Milton as in many other villages and towns, the main road is the High Street with other roads appropriately named leading to neighbouring built up areas i.e. Cambridge, Ely and Landbeach; Fen Road (originally Lane) and Church Lane connect with obvious places. The name of the remaining old road in Milton, Butt Lane is shrouded in history. This road over 200 years ago led only to the Roman road (Mere Way or Akeman Street) which runs North from Cambridge along the Western boundary of Milton parish and across the Fens towards Ely. Butt lane literally 'butted' on to the Mere Way and only after around 1800 did it continue to Impington; during the time of the Romans, Butt Lane may well have connected the Mere Way with the River Cam via Fen Road for the transport of goods.

In future editions of the news sheet, I will be reviewing names given to the more modern roads in the village. Many of these will be obvious to the 'older' inhabitants, but perhaps less so to our 'new arrivals'. As a foretaste of things to come, Fox's Close off Butt Lane - did a wily creature evade the huntsman in this part of the village, or was he a

notable person living nearby?

Who was Barnabas Shipp

At the Parish Council meeting on 2nd January we recommended that the new sheltered housing be named Barnabas Shipp Court. Why did we do this?

According to the Parish records Barnabas Shipp was at one time employed by the Parish as a "roadman" however his relevance to the

sheltered housing comes after his retirement.

In 1961 a motion was passed by the Parish Council to write to Mr Shipp commending him for voluntarily sweeping and cleaning the bus shelter near the entrance to the sheltered housing. He was then aged 90! Mr Shipp next comes to our attention in 1971 when he reached his centenary. The Parish Council congratulated him and voted to send him a case of wine. They also proposed to name the second phase of Old School Lane, then about to be built, Shipp Lane but due to a change in the plans this never happened.

The Parish Council now propose to remedy this, recommending that the new development for our older residents be named after Barnabas

Shipp.

#### Cambridge Rowing lake - update 25.3.98

Lottery application

The Trust submitted its application for Lottery funding for A Rowing Lake for Cambridge to the Sports Council in October '97. A Lottery decision is not expected until a National Rowing Strategy is completed for the ARA, the national governing body of rowing, in July '98. The cost estimate for the project is £13.93m. We have applied for 65% funding from the Lover Sports Fund, leaving us with £4.88m to raise. Over £2m has been pledged to date.

The proposal is for a 200 acre country park

including a 2000 metre eight lane course connected to the River Cam near Bates Bite Lock by a two lane canal and a 1000 metre four lane cut. The earliest possible date for filling the Rowing Lake is spring 2000. There will be free access for the public on foot or by bicycle. The cycle path which will go around the

lake will be connected to the river towpath.

The plans include a boathouse with manager's flat, an indoor rowing/sculling tank, disabled accessible changing rooms and boats for junior and schools rowing, as well as basic provision for adult beginners. Juniors and complete beginners are two groups who might not benefit fully from the Lake if they had to row down from the existing boathouses to access it, as the vast majority of crews using the Lake will do.


Ongoing rowing development in Cambridge

The Trust is working with the existing clubs to develop structures to recruit more people to rowing, particularly through links with schools. The Cambridge Rowing Trust Schools & Junior Rowing Group (with representatives from clubs, the ARA, Local Authorities and six local schools including Impington Village College) was set up for this purpose, new members from schools would be very welcome and should contact Rosemary Hoskins at the Trust.

A new working group on Veteran & Recreational Rowing is also meeting, with an initial focus on encouraging adult women beginners to take up the sport.
