
India Bike Ride For Mencap

All Saints Church Milton

Building the

In February 1998 a meeting was held at All Saints Church Milton to discuss some of the difficulties which are at present

being experienced with the Church buildings in Milton. Among
the issues raised at the meeting were; space for Junior Church limited and too open, noise control a problem between groups
and into the church, (ideally all Junior Church and Pathfinder groups need a room to call home), toilets not equipped (especially "disabled" one). lack of storage space for hall furniture. The vestry is used as an office, counselling room, it has a poor entry and its site was brought in to question. Current O.H.P. screen is a messy affair and detracts from the building. Music group corner is not ideal and looks temporary and it appears untidy when not in use.

As a result of this our Church architect, David Joy, was asked to draw up a long term plan for the development of the Church

buildings in order to address these issues. David Joy presented his proposals to a meeting of the congregation held in July.

A major part of what David Joy was asked to do was to provide a worship area which could be used flexibly, and which improved visibility for most people. The first task therefore was to, select the best focal point for the high table, the person leading worship, or the children's talk for example. A number of proposals were put before the meeting and the architect went to great lengths to portray the pro's and con's of each. For instance, by choosing a position on the south (right) side of the church and towards the front for the holy table, around 89% of the church area would have visibility, and greater flexibility is maintained. This position was used by David Joy in one of his computer aided designs as the position for the holy table and the people leading worship. It has the added bonus in that the south aisle is already raised. Scating would be on chairs arranged in semi circles in the nave and rows at the rear of the church. Normally the south aisle would not be used for congregational seating, but at festivals this could be used. The church would be estimated to have a normal capacity of 172, and 210 at festivals. The raised area of the south aisle would be extended and heightened through the front arch to provide a raised area which could be used flexibly, depending upon the nature of the service taking place. It has been noted that at certain occasions a central aisle is required and with the flexibility obtained this could quite easily be obtained.


It is clear that there are a number of areas of concern, particularly regarding the long term strategy for the building. However,

the next priority area for attention is the provision of more meeting rooms, and the PCC would like this to proceed as quickly as

possible. A quantity surveyor will therefore be asked to provide indicative costs for these areas. So that Diocesan permission for the work can be obtained as smoothly as possible, the Diocesan Advisory Committee will have to be consulted, and necessary changes made to the plans prior to formal application.

A Reflection

The thoughts in this column are about the church building. In truth however the Church consists of Christians who are its members and it is the building up of that Church which is most important. We are here to offer care and support to one another, and to reach out to the community of Milton. It would be a sad irony if this project distracted us from that most important task, and we should all be encouraged therefore to continue to make people our priority. Tony Stubbings

Plant a Tree for the Millennium

Millennium fever is taking hold and soon a state of emergency will be declared. How can we preserve our sanity in the face of this onslaught of celebratory delirium? A measured regime of realism might help - or taking a longer view. So why not grow and plant a tree?

'Don't sit under the apple tree with anyone else but me...'.
Trees are celebrated in song; they figure in our memories,
like the lamented elms, or the trees that peopled the
landscapes of our childhood; trees that were friends, in
whose branches Dad built a little house, or through whose

branches the moon shone into the bedroom.

'Trees of Time and Place' is a national programme for the new millennium which taps into this private reservoir of memory and affection which trees inspire in us. If you loved a tree once maybe you could collect seed from that very tree, or the same species at least, and grow and plant a successor to it.

Milton Parish Council plants new trees every year and if you would like to sow and grow the seeds of native trees for the millennium there will be an opportunity to plant the seedlings around the village; suggestions for sites will be welcomed for consideration. For planting outside private gardens native trees are to be preferred. October is the ideal month to collect tree seeds and we hope to plant between Nov. 2000 and Mar. 2001. Growing a tree from seed is fun and anyone can do it. Get the family involved, or maybe an organisation or club you belong to would enjoy a tree-growing project together.

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What's in the name of a road? No.3

During the last 30 years Milton has seen considerable housing development as reflected in the increase in its population i.e. in 1960 (850), 1971 (1700), 1991 (4100)

and in 1996 (4430).

At the end of the 1960's a wave of 'Close' developments began. Hall End was developed next to the site of the old school in Fen Road and the name appears to be an earlier name for Fen Road which ran along the southern boundary of the manorial estate of Milton Hall. Shirley Close arose on land behind Shirley Lodge (demolished 10 years ago) owned by Mrs. Shirley in the early 19th century. This development was extended to Pearson Close and court taking the name of a well-known local farming family. But it was to the west of the High Street and Cambridge Road where the major development occurred. Off Butt Lane, first Coulson and then Peter Goodin Closes are named after old trading families in the village, while Ken's Way is on the site of Ken Humphries old house. Ken was not only involved with the parish and district councils, but he was also a keen local historian producing many reports on the history and archaeology of the village.

Milton's nurseries, once well-known nationally, have now seeded houses. Walkling Way is named in memory of Eric Walkling nurseryman, and parish and district councillor for 42 years. Edmund Close takes the name of Messrs. Edmunds who operated the Alexandra Nurseries until 1961 when Edmund House was founded. The remaining nursery land and farmland have become the Milton Park Development with the main roads named after trees i.e. The Rowans. Sycamores, Oaks, Elms and Walnut Close; Faulkner Close is named after the head teacher of the old school in Fen Road in the 1930's, and James Carlton Court is in memory of the one time organist at the church. Winship Road at the industrial estate is named after the land owner.

The next and final article in this series will deal with the names associated with the most recent roads developed in Milton, particularly those north of Butt Lane.
