Milton Community Spirit Wins Award At Cambridge Evening News Community Challenge Night!

Milton Community Centre won the Runner Up Award in the Environmental Section of the Community Challenge Awards and was presented with a Certificate and £400.00 at the Guildhall on 22nd April.

Their application was helped greatly by the support and help from local groups including Edmund House Group of Homes, East Anglia's Children's Hospices and the Milton Day Care Centre, who all wrote letters supporting this project.

Together with the £2,000 grant from South Cambridgeshire District Council, £1,000 given by the Parish Council and £500 promised by The BBC Radio Cambridgeshire Trustline Appeal, the money will

enable the Milton Community Centre to go ahead with the construction of a two metre wide, 70 metre long pathway from the Centre to the country park to provide easier access for people with a disability, pushing prams or walking young children. It is hoped that the pathway will be enhanced by landscaping and seating with perhaps sensory planting in the future. It is not possible for these people to gain access via this route at present because access is along a muddy path with a short steep slope through a gate into the country park.

Well done to Julie Gray for pushing ahead with this project.



Spaceships or Bicycles
In the last edition of the Village View we asked for information about Benet Garage and we were very pleased to get a call from Mr Housden of Cambridge Road. He told us that Benet Garage was built in 1933 (there is a date on the house) by Richardson & Sons of Chesterton. They also built the two cottages next door. There were five caravans behind the garage where people lived and these were what could be seen in the old photo. Mr Butler had the garage first and then it was owned by Mr Jones. Mrs Jones was in the photograph with her niece Mrs Allen. Mr Housden served the garage and the people who lived in the caravans with milk which he took around the village on a barrow. Milk was 2¹/₂ old pennies a pint and was served with a jug. He

bought one of the caravans off the site by paying off their outstanding milk bill and giving them £20. He then took the caravan to Manor Farm which stood where the Agricultural College now stands and rebuilt it. It was then towed to Scratby near Yarmouth where it was used as a holiday home for the next 36 years.

Mr Housden remembers that the petrol pumps had a glass case into which you wound up petrol. The glass case held two gallons so if you needed more than that another 2 gallons would be wound up into the case. During the time Mr Jones owned the garage the pumps were changed to electric power.

We will be publishing more of Mr Housden's memories in future issues of this magazine. If you have any memories of old Milton we would be pleased to hear from you.



Milton Millennium Maze

What is it?

It is hoped to build a flat maze during the millennium similar to the drawing opposite which is based on two M's, MM standing for 2,000 as well as Millennium Maze or Milton Maze. The maze will be a flat maze similar to the very old one at Saffron Walden and also the one at Hilton which has just been restored. The Hilton Maze is around 400 years old. It is hoped that if we build such a maze, it will not only be an area for children to play but a millennium monument that hopefully will be around for many years - maybe even the next millennium!

Planning - The maze will be about 20 metres across and will be situated on one of the quiet corners of a green area in the village. The area has not been decided yet.

Who will be involved? -Well hopefully most of us! The maze will be laid in bricks. We hope that every child in the village from 0 upward will be involved - each laying their own brick in the maze. There will be a competition to decide who lays the first brick. Each child will put their name on a plan showing which brick they laid (hopefully mum or dad will help with this especially with those children who are still babies.) Each child will then be presented with a commemorative mug showing the logo of the maze. We have not decided yet on how to mark the centre of the maze but all suggestions are welcome. We hope to fill the grassed areas between the lines of bricks with bulbs so that we have a wonderful flower display in the spring of each year.

To go ahead with these plans we are looking for volunteer help - but we are just asking you to help for an hour. We will need about 20 people, each to volunteer 1 hour of help and we will be in a position to go ahead.

We would also like to hear from anyone who would be willing to level the site for us. Do you know anyone who could help with this initial ground work? We hope to make the laying of the maze a real village event with perhaps a village picnic, dancing and some other events. Initially we are hoping to lay the maze in the spring of next year.





All Saints' Pilgrimage to Ely Cathedral

Saturday 12th June 1999

The concept of a pilgrimage is known I from the earliest of times. A pilgrimage is a visit to a holy place somewhere where either a special event took place and is remembered, or perhaps somewhere associated with a holy person.

With the rapid approach of the new Millennium, what greater motivation does one need to join friends on a pilgrimage to Ely Catherdral. It will give an ideal opportunity to pause and reflect where we are in our relationship with God, and the directions our lives should be taking. It will also give pilgrims time to think about the witness of the Christians involved in the life of the Cathedral down the ages and then of course time will be there for us to have some space and think about our own journey of faith.

How are we going to arrive?

The actual day will begin with prayer at 9am in the Church, afterwards the journey to Ely will commence. How the pilgrims will travel to Ely is to be left to individuals. The options are quite clear: motor car, bicycle, river craft (canoe?), and of course walking via the 'Fen Rivers Way'. On our arrival in Ely, pilgrims will be meeting on the lawn to the rear of 'The Almonary', High Street, at 4.00pm. We shall be joining with other groups of pilgrims in the Cathedral for Evensong at 5.30pm. We should be leaving Ely at about 7pm. Comfortable walking and cycling rates will be adopted, 3 miles per hour, hiking, and 15 miles per hour biking, will be adhered to. The cycle route will follow a route which tradition tells us, was an ancient pilgrim route. Leaving Milton we travel to Landbeach then to Cottenham, taking the B1049 to Wilburton, straight over the crossroads on to an un-classified road leading to Grunty Fen and Witchford leading us to Ely. Walkers and cyclists will need a packed lunch and fluids.

If you feel that you would like to join the pilgrims from Milton on a meditative journey to Ely Cathedral, a warm welcome awaits.

MILTON MUMS MARCH ON!

That was the heading in the Cambridge Evening News nearly 20 years ago! And this is the picture! And still we march on into the Millennium

Jell, now several of those "mums" are now grandmothers (and continue playing netball) and Milton Netball Club is still It was almost twenty years ago when Milton Netball Club was

first formed. It all started by Pat Fletcher, a teacher at the Milton Primary School asking one of the mums to coach netball at the school. This particular mum could not remember any of the rules of netball, not having played since her own school days and so she bought a rule book. Some months later, a group of young mothers (and some not so young!) formed three teams who played on the car park at the old Village Hall each Sunday afternoon.

Eventually, to cut a long story short, the Chair of the Management Committee, Harold Easy, plus members of the Milton

Tennis and Netball Club drew up an agreement to let the new club share their one court, situated on the present Doctors' surgery site.

Two years later, with two teams and several trophies tucked under their belt Milton Netball Club built their own lighting system, with

several husbands digging the trenches and carrying out the main part of the work!

Now, almost twenty years later most of these mums have retired - although many of them still play an active part in supporting the club they first joined all those years ago. There are now three original members left, Janet Wilson, Sue Horrod and Julia Gray, the first Secretary of the Club. They are all over fifty years old and although they might not be the fittest and fastest of the club they certainly have the most experience and can still outwit even some of the youngsters with their cunning tactics!

We are now lucky enough to have four netball/tennis courts in Milton and are members of the Milton Community Centre Committee who provide the facilities that are probably the best in South Cambridgeshire including floodlighting of all courts. Netball has changed considerably over the years but still proves one of the best, easiest and fun ways of keeping fit and over the

years approximately 200 young girls and women have taken part and enjoyed playing netball for Milton Club.

This year Milton has once again proved successful - the first team gaining 2nd place in the second division (on a par with

Cambridge United!) and therefore promoted to the 1st Division with the second team doing well in the fourth division.

The Club are responsible for running this years' Summer League for South Cambridgeshire District Netball League starting on Thursday 13 May for ten weeks held at the Milton courts so if anyone is interested in playing please come along to the table and speak to any of our members or ring any of the numbers below. If you are an old member of our club we hope to see you at our Club's Millennium Reunion next year but more of that another time.....
