Turkish Earthquake - The Milton Connection

Milton's Gary O'Shea was part of the co-ordinating team in Britain who deployed a 13 man search and rescue team to a village called Duzce (pronounced Duchca) following the recent earthquake. Duzce is a village about twice the size of Milton where it is estimated that around 4,500 people lost their lives. The total loss of life for the area was about 55,000. During the six days the rescue team were working in Duzce they were only able to pull out one person alive, a 45 year old woman who was found in a collapsed five story building. He said that in some areas of the village everything looked normal but as you turned a corner you would find just heaps of rubble where buildings once stood. Most of the time the team were recovering bodies and this was most distressing for all concerned.

The International Rescue Corps, for whom Gary is Assistant Operations Director, is solely funded by public donations and their own efforts in fund-raising. Specialists that are sent are unpaid volunteers who are generally taking a combination of unpaid leave and holiday to go and help in disaster areas.

Fearless Fred the Fen Road Fox

I stopped the car; got out, and spoke to him at which he initially walked towards me, head on one side, deciding whether I was OK or not. Then, decision made, he ambled off with his characteristic leisurely stride.

Talking to other folks locally one reports seeing Fred peering curiously through their French Windows on a regular basis. Another neighbour remembers having the feeling he was being watched while working in his garden. Turning round he

found Fred gazing at him from the opposite corner of the lawn.



MILTON CRIME NEWS

Winter is approaching and the opportunist criminal will be taking advantage of the darker evenings or unprotected property; by stealing motor vehicles or belongings in them; as well as burgling premises.

In Milton reported crime has gradually reduced over the last five years, but this is no reason to be complacent. A comparison of the crimes for the last three years for January to August inclusive are as follows:-

160 crimes 1998 143 crimes 1999 110 crimes -Theft of or from motor vehicles; burglaries and criminal damage accounted for 50 crimes



Report on the Season from the COLTS' Manager

This has been a critical season for all youth cricket in Cambridgeshire. During last winter, a new authority was formed to deal more effectively with youth cricket right across the board: it was called the Cambridge Young Cricketer's Association. The aim was to provide help with the encouragement of cricket from primary school level (children of seven or eight) right through to the merging of the fifteen and sixteen year-olds with the adult club teams. It was also decided that any young player would only have to compete against children of their own age or ability. To do this successfully required (and will increasingly require) spaces (pitches) to be prepared, time given, in the management of coaching and parent involvement.

This season we elected to enter 3 teams, a team in the transition or Sunday League, Manager Bob Newton. Half of this team being composed of senior cricketers and half of Colts; this is a very important part of the new CYCA program. Another team in the Under 14's League, Manager Mark Dann, and a third team in the Under 11's league, administrated by myself. I also ran a number of friendly but proper games on Saturday mornings for the younger ones, who will play as Under 11's next season.

The Transition League, which is the artery through which new blood is introduced to the senior teams, and such a critical part of the club, has performed very much

better than originally thought.

The Under 14's did not do so well on paper, coming only low in their League. But it must be remembered that this was the squad which had not had the benefit of proper early coaching, what is more they had to play against some formidable opponents. But there are certainly half-a-dozen boys' in that age group who have shown commitment, improvement and stoicism and their rewards will come in the seasons that are ahead. The club is grateful to Mark Dann for managing this age group, also Peter Stoehr and Ken Trick for giving their time as coaches.

But it is to the Under 11's that Milton should look to find both success and promise. With only one exception all the Under 11's squad came from Milton Primary School. They came top of their division - for which, I am told; they will

receive a trophy in the form of a shield to put up in the pavilion.

In the Cup, a bigger, thirty overs-a-side competition, they reached the semi-final. Special mention of players must wait until Trophy Night, meanwhile the Cricket Club should be grateful to David Clark, Daniel Coston and Mark Barton, all excolts who elected to take a coaching course and helped with training during the winter. Pauline Brindle was invariably on hand to do the scoring, similarly Robert Henderson to umpire and give the boys the benefit of his experience in coaching young cricketers.

The season was made much more of a community activity, enjoyable now that there is so much parent involvement. Next season we look to one or two parents of the next generation of Under 11's to join the committee: by then the Club will be running an extra age group. With enough support, the future of cricket in Milton

looks promising.

We beat them earlier in the season, but lost one later against the team next from bottom, with almost all the regulars missing on a school excursion. But no good worrying about that now, or even the two players on holiday, one of whom is the valuable Jonathan Dann. Their team is claiming to be in the same boat, but they've been recruiting players mid-season, and know how vital this game is. So do our boys, judging from the way almost everyone turned up for practice last night, which makes a change. Even more surprising is that they're listening (apparently) to pre match advice.

David Ball loses the toss and we're batting first, just what we wanted! What we don't want is a repeat of the start against Haslingfield last week, when we lost 8 wickets in the

first seven overs and had a minus score, before the last two pairs worked wonders and

scored 67 without loss in 6 overs.

First pair of 'Mr. Dependable' Stuart Davies and 'Brilliant but erratic' Edward Capstick gave us a very good start. It would've been even better if they hadn't got out twice, but a net 17 is very satisfactory. Matt Wilson-Eames and David Ball add 13, but again get out twice and NCI's fielding is very good. The next pair Scott Ransome and James Henderson came near to disaster. Four wickets fall, including two run outs. Both runs were very gettable, and I make a mental note to strangle both players at the end of the innings. Incredibly they still get a net gain (of two), despite some bad luck, and a hard hit ball several times going straight to their fielders. But 232 is not a convincing score. Their umpire/manager seems to be adjusting the field every ball, and some of their players look very big for under 11s... and just in case we need yet another excuse for falling at the last hurdle, they have not complied with the little known rule which states that at least six bowlers shall bowl in the first 12 overs.

Just like the Haslingfield game, the innings comes good with the last two pairs. First Richard Brindle and Paul Sandford add a useful 17, mainly from Richard's bat; again two wickets right at the end of his innings just takes the edge off it, and confirms that Richard subscribes to the Edward Capstick religion of never allowing a performance to be completely unblemished. Then comes a brilliant 41 without loss from Luke Cox (11) and Edward Conlon (20), fine hitting and sharp running between the wickets, to bring us up to 288, while NCI's bowling and fielding go to pieces.

This score should be good enough, but a lot will depend on the accuracy of our bowling and, sure enough, some wides are being given away from the start. The first pair are not messing about, but luckily for us David Ball's bowling is right on target. Two superb clean bowled's in his first over and two more in his next with only 3 runs conceded! Stuart (2 for 23) and Edward (2 for 25) also bowl steadily and even Richard is on target apart from one outrageous no ball. With their last pair needing 47 it looks all over. They also have an injured batsman who needs a runner, which is generally bad news for the batting side. Here, however, their runner uses it to advantage, setting off for everything and anything and now it's our turn to panic.

David's last over has everything: Two catches, one ruled out for a no ball, extras, singles turned into threes, boundaries, a run out, another wicket (making his final figures 5 for 23), a coronary or two etc. - a microcosm of a season, which has ended in triumph with victory by 18 runs.
