Brewing in Milton Again
Beer is being brewed again in Milton after a break of over seventy years. The last brewery closed in the 1920s. Now Richard Naisby and Tony Brooks have set up the Milton Brewery in the village.

Tony and Richard first met in Pakistan in 1996 and it was there that they hatched their plan to brew beer together. Today they're brewing a variety of beers and supplying local pubs including the Waggon and Horses here in the village and the Crown and Punchbowl in Horningsea.

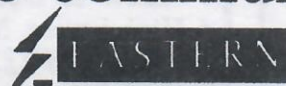
There will be no access through the Country Park entrance on to the Recreation Ground.

They can also supply firkins (72 pints) or pins (36 pints) for your parties.

Since they launched their first beer, Pegasus a copper coloured bitter (4.3%), back in the summer they've expanded their range to include Jupiter (3.5%) a light summer beer, Cyclops (5.3%), and Minotaur (3.3%) a dark mild.

They're now planning their beer to herald the millennium. Called Mammon it will be a strong beer of 7% ABV. It will be available in polypins for parties as well as being sold to local pubs.

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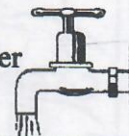

Nothing like at home where we all looked after ourselves.

The draft Register of Electors is now available and a copy is on display at Milton Community Centre for the electorate to check that their names appear on the Register. The final register will be published in February 2000.

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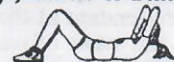
