
The 1999 Poppy Appeal in Milton realised £3255.49, which is up by £373.58p on 1998.



Milton was also able to see some of the fireworks from Cambridge City going off as well as others in the surrounding area. At one time, just after midnight the rumbles all around sounded like the rumbles of thunder. Once the tidying up was done and we were leaving the site, a lone bird could be heard singing very loudly close by

Do come along and try your skills at woodwork all materials and tools will be supplied, only £5.00 per box. If we don't use all the materials at the weekend, they will be available during the afternoons of the half term

week.

A Railway Station for Milton!

On 10th January, Milton Parish Council briefly discussed, as requested, a proposal to open a railway station in Milton, beside the level crossing in Fen Road.

Currently villagers must travel by car though a congested city to Cambridge Station (30 minutes in peak time) or Waterbeach (10 minutes) when taking the train for work or leisure. Only a station in the village itself would enable the 4000+ residents to walk or cycle to get a train and leave the car at home (saving time, petrol and parking costs).

Echoes From The Past

any smallholders in Milton engaged in market gardening from the mid 19th LV century, the area of land rising from 5 acres in 1875 to 21 acres by 1895. In the mid 19th century there were commonly 4 or 5 such gardeners and branches of the Coulsons and Easys were in business as market gardeners and florists until the 1930s.

In the 1920s, there were also 10 acres of soft fruit, mostly strawberries and

gooseberries, besides 20 acres of orchards, largely apples and plums.

The Milton and District Co-operative Society, founded in 1912, which provided its smallholders with seed and tools, had 30 local members in 1942. It closed in 1962.

From the 1880s tomatoes, cucumbers, early lettuces and cut flowers were produced, mostly in extensive greenhouses south west of the village, including the Vinery, later Alexandra, Nurseries by the Cambridge road, open from the 1890s to 1961. Milton Nurseries was to the south and had 6 acres under glass. This was established by 1900 and closed around 1978. The Enterprise Nurseries was started c1978.

There was a windmill, which belonged to the Manor but this had disappeared by 1666!

The Manorial estate included a smithy as early as the mid 1600s and a blacksmith was working as late as 1960 making wrought iron gates.


A tailor was recorded in 1515, a wheelwright in 1731 and in 1830, trades and crafts

maintained 18 households compared with 56 dependent on farming.

From the 1840s Milton had one or two carpenters, four or five shoemakers and The Neeches were saddlers and harness makers from the 1880s and were also cycle agents in the 1910s and 1920s. A laundry opened c1930 and in 1942 was staffed by 21 women. It was still open in 1960 as was the Cambridge Concrete Co. established around 1936. It made roof tiles and obtained its materials from pits dug south east of the village. These became the Country Park.
