We have taken this as an opportunity to redesign the site to make it easier for you to navigate and for us to maintain. We hope you like the new design.





While the main focus tends to be on singing accompanied by a band, there is an activity for most people, like dance, drama, playing an instrument, operating the PA system, video recording, writing, fun, games and outings.

They started five years ago, and have around 50 members. In addition to weekly meetings, they arrange concerts and fund-raising dinners, they perform in places ranging from local garden parties and old people's homes to Somerleyton Hall and the Mumford Theatre, Southwark Cathedral and York Minster. Every year they attend the National Ten Sing Festival in the October Half Term. Last February they arranged a trip to Norway and will be going again in the February Half Term in 2002.

Everyone is welcome - there is no auditioning. The group is FOR and BY teenagers, with adult co-ordinators, so the young people themselves influence the

choice of material worked on.

MILTON HALL

The modern Milton Hall was built by Samuel Knight who probably completed it in 1794. Its surrounding park was laid out to the design of Knight's friend, Humphrey Repton, producing a vista east from the house surrounded by plantations, and a lake to the south east. According to contemporary maps, this lake was called Lake Clytemnestra. (A photo of Reptons gates can be seen in the Milton Millennium photo collection).

In 1794-95, to enlarge his grounds to the west, Samuel had the Cambridge-Ely

turnpike road diverted away from the west front of his house.

After being offered for leasing in 1807 and 1814, the house was occupied by the Knights and Baumgartners until the 1850s. In 1862 it was sold to Richard Miller, a Cambridge wine merchant. The Revd. Charles William Giles occupied it from 1862 until his death in 1888, after which it was sold to the Pryors of Cambridge c 1889 (see photo in the Community Centre of a member of the Pryor family).

The Hall was used in the 1930s to house refugee Basque children and between 1939 and 1945 as military billets and in 1948 it was sold to the Eastern Electricity Board.



The walk to the river in the spring sunshine brings back memories of the 6th February. That night, whilst commuters were still dragging their cars out of the flooded Waterbeach Station car park, we stood at the Fen Road rail crossing looking out across the fields. A biting cold wind gusted fitfully across the water that rippled all the way from the river to the railway embankment. Bracketed by the naked trembling branches of a tree and illuminated by starlight, the reclamation of the flood plain by the river had a sinister air to it. 'You may think it's yours', it said 'but I can always take it back!' A short dash down the remnant of the road still above water. Looking back, Venus shone low over Milton, her light reflected in a momentary patch of calm in the restless lake. We sped back home out of the bitter wind, past the other occasional passers-by, braving the freezing air on their way to view the phenomenon.







watercourses and disrupting navigation.

Pollarding is the method most commonly used to maintain a manageable size of tree and involves the occasional removal of all growth above a given height. Originally this height was determined by the size of local grazing animals in order to protect the new growth but today is generally between 2 and 3 metres. The River Cam Conservancy manage about 870 willows between Byron's Pool, south

of Cambridge, and Bottisham Lock to the north. "We try to pollard between 80 and 100 trees every year," said foreman Colin Sparkes. "The trees were planted in about 1840 to provide timber for bank reinforcements although today our main concerns are safety and unobstructed navigation," he added. Falling demand means that most of the timber is now given away as either wood chips or logs for the fire.

Willow timber is no longer the important commodity it once was but the trees themselves remain vital to the numerous species of wildlife which rely on them. With careful management their long-term future will be assured and they will continue to grace our landscape as they have for centuries. by Paul Capitain of the Wildlife Trust

The next day I rode out on my bike, finding the river path accessible again on the Milton side. In the early morning sunshine, the receding flood had a more benevolent look. 'It was last like this in the '60s' came the comment from a walker scouting the paths ahead of a rambler's outing as we gazed across the still flooded banks towards Horningsea. The weir and the lock were irrelevancies to the water as it flowed undisturbed in a broad sweep under the footbridge. Vortices gently stirred the sliding water and in the distance a flock of seagulls settled in the reflected blue by the railway line. The river had been briefly roused to leisurely stretch its muscles and was now returning to its usual somnambulant state



As a result of observations of Uranus by American astronomer Percival Lowell between 1893 and 1897, he detected anomalies in Uranus's orbit which he felt were not adequately explained by the presence of Neptune. From his research he calculated the position of a ninth planet, but he never succeeded in sighting it. After Lowells death on the eve of his 75th birthday, Pluto, as it is now known, was first observed by Clyde Tombaugh, an astronomer working at Flagstaff Observatory, the observatory founded by Lowell.

Answer c. 1941. In April 1941, near Rostock on the Baltic Sea coast, a new Heinkel He 280 took off to become the first jet fighter in flight. It was able to reach 785 km/h and a ceiling of 37,000 feet. Another new invention incorporated into the design was the ejector seat.

Are You Entitled to a FREE Bus Pass?

The new scheme will give passholders a 50 per cent reduction on standard single and return fares. People eligible include pensioners (men 65+, women 60+) and various groups of people with disabilities.

The blind and partially sighted will

continue to get free travel.

Passes will be available through council offices and most post offices from April 2nd and will be issued free, but people will have to provide a passport size photo with their first application. The new passes will be in two parts, a photocard which will be kept permanently and a renewable pass, as at present.
