
Another member of the Milton club, Carol Collett from Chatteris, attained black belt first Dan on the same evening.

In issue 43 (June 2000) of the Village view, I was introduced as the village archaeological warden, a voluntary post acting as a liaison between the County Sites and Monuments Record Office (SMR) at Shire Hall and local archaeological matters. This post was the first in the County, now there are several more representatives in our villages known as PAW's (Parish Archaeological Wardens). It is the aim of Dr Tim Reynolds, Senior Archaeologist at Shire Hall to co-ordinate a team of PAW's as from this Summer. To give impetus to the scheme, I will be writing articles for the Village View on aspects of archaeology in Milton which I hope will complement those informative pieces 'Echoes of the Past' by Michael Spooner which deal primarily with people and happenings in more recent times.

As an introduction to Milton's archaeology, about 3 years ago a leaflet 'The Milton Archaeological Trail' was produced by the County Archaeological Field Unit at Fulbourn sponsored by Enventure Southern and East Waste Ltd. Unfortunately the village was the last to be made aware of the leaflet and most have now been distributed to the public at events outside Milton! I will try and get more leaflets printed. Briefly, the total length of the trail is 10 miles as a circular route starting at the Country Park, along the River to Waterbeach through Landbeach and down the Roman Road to Butt Lane. There are many archaeological and historical features on the Trail which will be a basis for my future articles.

Echoes of the Past OLD MILTON

In the 19th century the village had 4 or 5 public houses. The Three Tuns, established by 1765, closed after 1910. This public house was situated at the junction of Fen Road and the High Street. The White Horse, still on the High Street, also opened in the 1760s. The Lion and Lamb, open by 1841 was in a 17th century house, cased later in brick. Between 1848 and 1870 it was the meeting place of the local lodge of the Ancient Shepherds. At the Jolly Brewers on the junction of Fen Road and Church Lane, the Essex family ran a brewery business from the 1840s to c 1925.

The census of 1881 shows a family to be living in The Greyhound public House. The location of the Greyhound is uncertain, but the entry in the Census suggests that it also was near the High Street/Fen Road junction.

WILLIAM COLE

The antiquary William Cole, a pioneer of local history in Cambridgeshire, lived at Milton between 1770 and his death in 1782. Between 1768 and 1770 he spent £600 on reconstructing and enlarging a small timber framed 17th century farmhouse belonging to Kings College. He built two bow windows with Gothic window frames toward the garden, and incorporated fragments of late medieval masonry in the north exterior walls. (See photos in the Milton Millennium collection) His collection of stained glass in the windows was removed and sold under his will in 1783. Mr T W Dunn, an antiques dealer, who bought the house in the 1920s, added a bay to the west in matching style by c1930. The house is in Fen Road.

Barnabas Court



Details of The New Kerb Side Recycling

The scheme consists of every household receiving a green plastic kerbside recycling box (made from 100% recycled plastic). The box is used by residents for storing recyclable materials (except glass) in between collections. The materials to be collected will include: newspapers, magazines, junk mail, telephone directories (not yellow pages), textiles, steel food tins, steel drinks cans,

aluminium drinks cans and glass bottles, jars.

The box is then collected fortnightly, residents are asked to place the box at the same point as they currently place their black refuse sacks for collection. It is requested that residents place glass bottles and jars in plastic bags or another container next to the kerb side box. The collection day for the kerbside recycling scheme will in the majority of villages be the same day as the refuse collection.

To help remind residents of the collection days and what materials can be recycled an information leaflet with a calendar will be

circulated on a regular basis. The first of these leaflets will be delivered with the box.

As part of the scheme £5.71 will be paid to a local community group or the Parish Council for every tonne of material collected. By using the kerbside recycling scheme with the inclusion of glass an average household will be recycling 33% of the waste produced - saving valuable resources and protecting the environment.
