40th Anniversary (2nd October 2001)

Forty years ago a group of parents had the vision and fortitude to organise the purchase of an old Victorian house in Milton for around £8,000. The house was renovated and adapted for use as a residential care home for people with a learning disability. Thus, Edmund House was born. 



The tree and the 2 old staff houses are all that now remain.

As you can see forty years on there has been an enormous change. In 1989 building developers bought the house and land, knocked down the house and built the present housing estate. The deal included incorporating a number of houses within the estate that were to become the present Edmund House Group of Homes (Cambridge

Mencap). The homes have been a tremendous success and have become truly integrated within the local community. This is due, in no small way, to the support and sensitivity of you, the local population. Ian May, Edmund House's General Manager, states that "without the valued support of the local community Edmund House would not have been the success it is"

The Edmund House Group of Homes now consists of 8 small residential homes (1 in Chesterton), 1 home specifically for respite care, 1 council house (in Cambridge) and 2 council flats where two individuals have fulfilled their life's dream, to live in a place of their own

All of the homes, bar the council house and flats, are staffed 24 hours, 7 days a week. The individuals living in the council house and flats receive staff support at various times in the day but no overnight support. In total, 42 people with a learning disability (and some with physical disabilities) are offered supported accommodation, with a further 4 beds for respite care. Each of these 42 people is treated as an individual, which is reflected in their varied daytime programmes.

Swallows Café - The Swallows café is situated in Milton Country Park and Edmund House Group of Homes (Cambridge Mencap) have been responsible for successfully running it since 1995. The café offers people with a learning disability the opportunity to experience a real work situation in a supported environment. They are involved in all aspects of the business including: purchase and collection of goods from 'cash and carry', stocking of café. serving customers

operation of till, clearing tables and washing up. The café is open every weekend of the year and school holidays. This project is unique in that it is totally self-funding and since the initial 'start up' funding there has been no need to seek further financial assistance.

Gardening team - Every Monday and Tuesday a small team from Edmund House goes out into the local community and offers a gardening service to local people who are struggling with lawn mowing, hedge trimming etc. This offers people with a learning disability a positive physical activity, plus it helps people in their local community.

Fare Shares Café - Situated in Emmanuel United Reformed Church in Trumpington Street, Cambridge this is a partnership between people from the church and people from Edmund House. The café was first opened in 1999 for 1 day a week; it is now open 3 days a week (Wednesday to Friday) between 10.30am and 3pm. We hope to be open 5 days (Tuesday to Saturday) in the New Year. The café offers lunches, cooked


on the premises, plus cake and drinks.

People with a learning disability from Edmund House and the local community, work alongside volunteers from Emmanuel URC sharing the responsibilities of : -


a) work in the kitchen - food preparation, cooking, washing up etc., and

b) work in the 'front of house' taking orders, serving meals, clearing and wiping tables, working the till

This means the café offers people with a learning disability the opportunity to gain real work experience, to improve their food handling and preparation skills, to improve their communication and money handling skills and to be seen as making a positive contribution to the local community.



FUTURE PROJECTS

St. John's College, Cambridge - In January 2002 we are starting a brand new course which will offer people with a learning disability the opportunity to learn a trade, gain relevant qualifications, obtain a working reference and receive 1-1 tuition in a work setting. The course is a 2-year, full-time, VAC/NVQ course in Catering. It will be held in the Catering Department of St. John's College, administered by Cambridge Mencap, where 3 individuals will receive training in catering from a full time Tutor plus a Learning Support Assistant. The emphasis will be on practical, work based learning.

<u>Domiciliary Care</u> - On September 1st, 2001, Edmund House (Cambridge Mencap) were registered with Cambridgeshire County Council as an official provider of Domiciliary Care. This means that along with running our residential homes we will be able to offer support/care to individuals in their own homes.

'Exposed by the trowel'

Inquiries are underway to obtain a grant for another print-run of the leaflet 'The Milton Archaeological Trail'. Original copies for reference only, are present in the Community Centre and the Visitor Centre in Milton Country Park.

Beginning in this issue, I will reflect on the archaeological evidence for the peoples who have lived in and around our village, starting with prehistoric times. Why do we live in Milton? If you moved here for work, education, retirement, amenities etc., then some of these reasons applied to the first settlers in the Stone Age before 1800 BC. The landscape was gentle and to early settlers often from far away places, accessible by rivers and tracks. Milton has developed on 2nd/3rd terrace alluvium (gravels) with good draining soil along the fen-edge of the River Cam flood plain. The good soil has supported many crops and livestock and the underlying gault clay has been used for pots and for buildings (bricks and tiles). But the earliest settlers were hunter/gatherers who survived on the wild life in the fens and extensive woodlands where fields exist today.

Archaeological evidence for early man in Milton has arisen from worked flints. A Mesolithic (Middle Stone Age, 7500-3000 BC) flint blade was found North of Butt lane near the Roman Road. Neolithic (New Stone Age, 3000-1800 BC) flints appeared recently during rescue excavations by the County Council's Archaeological Field Unit prior to extension of the land-fill site. Evidence for a mammoth, possibly hunted by Palaeolithic man (Old Stone Age, 40000-7500 BC) arose from the finding of a tooth and tusk in 1962 inside the Fen Road entrance to the Country Park. r Thomas Moore, one of the founders of the Dunn Nutritional Laboratory, used to enjoy sitting at Baits Bite lock as a respite from all the pressures of work. When he died, his daughter Jennifer Kyle, dedicated a seat at the lock to his memory. Here is a poem reflecting on the area her father enjoyed.

Unforgettable Unforgotten

Come with me by the river. As it wends its way to the sea. in the latter case Milton's winning margin being 26 runs, the lowest of the season. Apart from that, results were rarely in any doubt. 

News From Milton Parish Council


How does Milton Parish Council spend your money?

Milton Parish Council is committed to following the principle of 'Best Value' i.e.

"delivering the best service possible to all the inhabitants of Milton in the most cost effective, efficient way". During 2000/01 Milton Parish Council spent a total of £149,562 including £768,50 on capital schemes (£72,712 net of capital schemes). The pie chart shows broadly how this money was spent. Note that the capital expenditure is not shown in the pie charts. The Parish Council continues to support the many sporting, social and leisure activities at the community centre and recreation grounds through its grant of £20,000. Money was spent on the following capital schemes - a multi-use court and youth building at The Sycamores Recreation Ground, new play equipment on Coles Road Recreation Ground, cemetery path and purchase of the allotments land. The money for the allotments land was taken from reserves – accrued from the sale of land for the sheltered housing project. There is now a balance of £40,000 left from the sale of this land for the purchase of land for recreational purposes. Total income for the year was £94,156. Budget figures for 2001/02 show an estimated expenditure of £77,000. The Parish Council has received £67,000 from the Parish's share of the Council Tax for 2001/02. This means that a 'Band D' house is paying £40.98, an increase of £0.48 from last year.







Smells in the Village

The village has been plagued with bad smells this year. Firstly from the landfill site, where the composting has lead to an increase in unpleasant smells from the west, and secondly from the sewage works to the south, which has been particularly bad of late. Many people have been complaining to the parish council. We're now asking people to contact the people responsible directly, either by email or letter, to complain. If you do so please could you copy your message to Jim Daniels so we know what's being said.

Vandalism in the Village

Milton Parish Council had an open meeting with village residents on Monday 3rd September at which several acts of vandalism near the Youth Centre were described.

These included:-

Loud music from car stereos.

Cars/motor bikes using car-park as a race track.

Litter/bottles/cans left lying around and smashed bottles in car-park, recreation ground and play areas.

Verbal abuse to residents.

Fires being lit in bins and other areas and a fire one morning at a house in The Sycamores.

Damage being caused to cricket nets, cricket square and football pitches.

Similar incidents occurred at the other five play areas in the village and at the other recreation ground at Coles Road. As a result of suggestions from the floor, Milton Parish Council (MPC) has requested that:-

Milton Community Centre (MCC) take action to assess the implications of installing and managing the use of a gate/barrier; Milton Youth Centre Management Group (MYCMG) and MPC Youth Committee meet to produce report for MPC as to way forward for the Youth Centre;

Quotes be obtained for CCTV at both Recreation Grounds; MPC and Police meet Tescos and Dillons to discuss the problem of sale of alcohol to teenagers.

Use of a security firm to be examined. The police have requested that where the identity of troublemakers were known, their names should be given to the police.

Travellers and Stopping up

Travellers visited the disused part of Landbeach Road in August. Local residents asked if this old road could be stopped up to prevent a recurrence. The Parish Council is investigating. I should be able to report back to you in the next edition of the Village View.
