Milton Skaters visit Peterborough to show youth workers what is needed

Groups of Milton skaters and Parish Councillors have been working together on plans for a skate facility.

For nearly five years it has been the dream to develop such a facility. Over the last 18 months there has been fund raising, including a car wash event, and funding promised from South Cambridgeshire District Council, Milton Parish

Council, Garfield Weston Foundation, W.R.E.N. and Cambridge Evening News Community Challenge.

The facility will be placed on the recreation ground behind the Tesco store next to the basketball court; the cricket nets have been moved further across to make room for this. Plans took longer than expected because there were many different ideas from different groups of young people in the village and it was more difficult to raise money than expected. "It really looks like it will happen soon," said one of the young people involved. "With limited budget and differing opinions it has taken time and been difficult," said Linda Henderson from the Parish

Council Youth Committee.
On 16th August 2002 final plans were agreed between a group of young people and the youth committee. These consist of a half-pipe, a quarter-pipe, a grindrail and a flatbank. Space will be left in the site for the addition of a funbox to be added as more funds become available. If you can help with raising some funds please contact Hazel Smith on Tel. 860752. It is hoped the equipment will be in place before the end of 2002.



News in brief

Thatching in Church Lane One of the village's old properties has recently been rethatched.

Demolition in Progress A bungalow in Cambridge Road has now been demolished to make way for 2 new homes.

Coles Road Car Fire At lam in the morning of 24th September, Fire Fighters were called out to an abandoned car which had been set alight. As the car burned a short circuit caused its lights to come on followed by its horn, much to the pleasure of local residents.

Accident Blackspot Traffic Lights Traffic lights have at last been installed on the busy junction where Butt Lane meets the A10. Over the years there have been many serious accidents here.

Cycle Bridge over A14 Another short delay has stopped work being started this Autumn but work on the main structure should now start early in the new year.

Landbeach Road (old road) The Parish Council hopes to install bollards and a gate as soon as the County Council issues the stopping up notice which is being pressed hard for and is expected soon.

Sewage Works There has now been a meeting at the sewage works to press for improvements on site to reduce the smell that has emanated from the works in recent months. We were given details of improvements that should now have been implemented. As a result of the meeting various people have now been asked to keep a diary and note any particular odour problems. There will be a further meeting in the next few weeks to receive a report on progress.

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MILTON 2000 - MINUS A YEAR OR TWO

Having transgressed somewhat, let me quickly take you back to 1918 and the War By this time Mother was carrying my Sister Edie and come early morning of 28th January 1919, a morning of deep snow and the farm completely cut off other than by foot, my sister decided to put in an appearance. Leaving Mother with their thirteen year old son, father set off, over the fields, crossing the Histon Railway Line to fetch his Sister Emma. There was no 'Rosie' in those days, no telephone, no electricity and no running water. Hurricane lamp in hand, they both set off on the return journey. Aunt Emma was not particularly large in stature but she was sturdy and had the loveliest of bright rosy cheeks I have ever seen. So, in a way, Father had his very own 'Mobile Rosie' with a wealth of experience in her duties ahead and a Shepherds wife to boot in which field she would have almost certainly given assistance to Uncle Fred of a similar kind. All went well apparently and Aunt Emma returned home alone thinking, no doubt, this could well be the last time she would be called upon to perform midwifery service. However, it wasn't to be and twenty two months later, in November 1920, I arrived on the scene and things were never the same in the household from that time on. For a start, I made a lot of noise. When I exercised my lungs the pigs fell silent and they were housed some one hundred yards away. If I saw anyone coming up the farm road, and this went on for two or three years, well, if Neighbourhood Watch had existed in those days, they would have recommended me for a 'Young Achievers Award'. Then, when at the age of three, whilst playing with my Sister in the Stack Yard, I jumped off some straw and broke a leg, well, not only did I silence the pigs but the old hens flew up They sent for Dr Robson and he had to come all the way from his Surgery near the Station at Waterbeach. Confirmation, it was broken, daft lot, wasn't that exactly what I'd been telling them! By now the Pony and Trap was ready and as we moved slowly down the road away from the farm, so too normality returned to the farm. I started taking a breather, not so much to get my breath back but to concentrate on this new word I kept hearing them talk about. 'Addenbrookes,' I didn't like the sound of that at all! What would they do, what was the survival rate? Nowadays I would have included, "How long will I have to wait". My mind was made up, conserve your energies boy, a bit of the 'silent' routine might lull them into a false sense of complacency. I think the old Pony also appreciated my decision. He'd stopped the erratic, almost stumbling gait of heretofore and had taken on a much smoother movement in his stride. It wasn't long before, 'Oh my God!', (with Mother nearby, glad I kept that under my

breath). What a building, never seen anything so enormous as this before, a chap could easily get lost forever in there. Well, I might get lost on my own but I comforted myself in the knowledge that as a last resort I had the means to make sure

they knew exactly where I could be located.

We came to a stop in the front Court Yard. Dad stayed with the Pony whilst Mother accompanied me on the stretcher into the lift. Never been in one of these before! Is this the way you get to this heaven they keep talking about, I wondered. Don't want to go there yet awhile, didn't deserve to die so soon, after all, hadn't done that much hollering, had I? Whether I had or not, it was time to let Father know of our progress. I sensed the lift hesitate as I broke into my routine, the decibel scale moved upwards in unison with the lift and the old Pony in the Court Yard showed all the previous symptoms of shellshock as father struggled to restrain him. Father told me later that I was taken to the Tipperary Ward, the highest in the building, and he could still hear me clearly in the Court Yard outside. Home at last and on the mend, Father made me a crutch out of some old wood to support my walking. A simple, straightforward thing to do you would think but, no, in my case I became so attached to this 'third leg', although I could walk quite comfortably without it, I would not do anything unless it was with me. Until, that is, one day my sister upset me. Throwing down my crutch, I ran after her. Whether or not I caught her is of no consequence, all I know is that when I returned for my crutch, Mother had already got it burning on the kitchen fire.

As with a lot of girls in those days, my wedding present list was non-existent. I did have a pair of sheets (one of which I still have after 56 years) and a cheque for £10. If anybody remembers Mrs Saggs I received from her an embroidered tablecloth with tray cloth to match. I also had two glass jugs which cost two shillings (10p), two fruit serving spoons, a table runner (with the price of 1s 11d still on it) two guest towels (which I still use) and that's about it.

Brides of today will not think much of this but I was happy with my lot. Most of the presents I collected myself whilst going round for the Doctor's Club.

Soon after my marriage I fell ill with scarlet fever and rheumatic fever and was off work for eight months during which time I had no pay. I left work after nearly eleven years with not a penny rise in wages. There are no complaints about that as it taught me a lot about how to manage on nothing.

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Milton Junior Cricket 2002

The Milton CC junior sides have excelled themselves again this season. The Under 11 and Under 13 teams both retained the league titles their predecessors had won the previous season, the Under 11s being undefeated for the second season running. The Under 13s recovered well from a mid-season dip. Having won the first six matches, two league defeats in a row were then followed by elimination from the cup at the quarter-final stage. But four storming performances at the end of the league season brought things round. Longstanton, the strongest opposition, were beaten for the second time, an earlier defeat by Over was avenged, and the season concluded with a crushing win over Burwell. With a big squad of 20, depth in batting was an important factor in the team's success. Time and again the tail was able to score runs in a way that all opponents could only envy. James Henderson, the top run scorer, frequently held the innings together when faced with the best opposition bowling, and also hit two big scores of 51 and 47. Under 10 Michael Franklin included a superb undefeated 53 in his impressive average of 31, and included a season's record stand of 87 with Henderson in the final league match. Ryan Carey and Nick Seaman (with a brilliant 49 in the first Burwell league match) put in some hard-hitting performances, and there were useful innings from Simon Coston, Ciaran O'Kane (who ran enterprisingly between the wickets and took joint catch of the season with Seaman), James Tyrrell, Jack Franklin, Charlie Peake and under 10 Nick Davies, whose economy rate with the ball was remarkable for a leg spinner. Fielding was a bit variable, although it would be hard to better that in the Cup defeat of Burwell, when the opponents were dismissed for 15. Carey took some fine catches at short cover and Michael Franklin was an agile wicket-keeper, with Jack Franklin and Henderson deputising capably on occasions. Ryan Carey was the leading wicket-taker with many good

performances, using pace and spin. Seaman and Simon Coston were very economical, and Tyrrell delivered some excellent wellflighted slow bowing. Jack Franklin, O'Kane and Henderson all put in some crucial spells. Some useful contributions with bat or ball also came from Ali James, Jim Reynolds, John Underwood, Charlie Peake, Tom Fenner, Michael Boyle, and Adam Coles.

After winning the U10 Premier League last season, it was unclear whether to enter the team into the U11s into the Premier league this season. Eventually, it was decided to enter the regional division as it was felt that all the team members would benefit from the less demanding structure. The decision was, in hindsight, a good one. Our first game, a friendly against King's College School, and the first round Cup match against Granta, both resulted in emphatic defeats. The season now depended upon the League games, and to this end the U11's proved very strong, winning 9 of the 10 games. The only other game was washed out as a poor

Longstanton side were staring defeat in the face when the heavens opened and gave them 2 points for a void match.

Congratulations go to Nick Davies (spin bowler), Michael Franklin (batsman/wicket keeper), Kate Saunders (bowler) and Nick Seaman (all-rounder) who all represented the County during the season. Kate, especially, receives accolades for playing County U13's and voted the Player of the Season. It is not unusual for a village team to call up younger players to fill a squad. This year we were very lucky to have talented cricketers to call upon. Luke Saunders, George Sanderson, Stuart Kelsey and Jack Wilkinson from the U10's, James Linstead (U9) and Will Conlon (U8) all showed great promise for the future of Colt's success. In all, 16 players represented the U11's. Apart from those mentioned previously, significant contributions came from Chris Diston, Jonathan Heath, Tom Linstead, Joe Mannu, Hannah O'Kane and Laurie Sawiuk. For the record:

During the season we were able to enter a team of 9 players for the Abington Kwik Cricket competition and after winning all 3 group games, quarter and semi finals against Cockenach and Camden respectively found ourselves in the Final against Granta. Unfortunately, as in the early part of the season, Granta won easily. However, the appearance of a Milton team in the final deserves high praise and commitment was never in doubt!

The most pleasing aspect of the team's performance was the spirit shown by the players. Everybody contributed and encouraged each other. My thanks go to all the parents/supporters who assisted during the summer with refreshments, travelling, organising, etc. Those balmy summer evenings fall into the memory much too quickly.

The Alpha Group runs something called an Alpha Course. If you are looking for an evening class this autumn then you might want to consider Alpha. More than half a million people in this country alone have attended an Alpha Course and last year Alpha was the subject of a 12 week ITV documentary.
