

Did you see anything at around 5pm on Friday November 1st? Both





Do you love your compost heap? Does it give you satisfaction to spread the lovely stuff on your soil and know it can do nothing but good? No?

Perhaps you feel composting is not for you - smelly, difficult to do, you don't have the right stuff to make it or not enough room.

Cambridgeshire County Council hasn't got enough room for all the waste we are producing. They spent £6 million last year to dump it in land-fill sites. South Cambridgeshire District Council spent another £1 million collecting it. About quarter of this waste could be composted, not to mention recyclable items.

As a volunteer for the CCC Master Composter scheme I can help get you started. We already have kerbside collections of paper, cans and glass. Kitchen waste and what goes into your waste paper bin can become something valuable and useful too. I'll be happy to talk rubbish with you or any groups who are interested.

News in Brief

Many were woken by loud bangs on the morning of November 2nd at 6.30am! Apparently this was the army doing something at Waterbeach Barracks. If we heard this in Milton so loud, imagine the reaction of Waterbeach residents!

Bus Fares Go Up - Dayrider tickets which offer unlimited travel in and around Cambridge and include Milton are now £3.00 (up from £2.50) and the weekly Megarider, is now £8.00 (up from £7.50). Generally there has been an increase in all fares.

Golf Course - A further set of plans have been received by Milton Parish Council showing the course and associated buildings. The Course is planned for the area beyond PI and opposite the allotments.

Green Boxes bring in extra cash for the village - Milton Parish Council has received £790 from the green box recycling scheme. The more we recycle the more money we will get to spend.

Refuse Collections Christmas, New Year and Easter - District Councillor, Richard Summerfield reported at Milton Parish Council that he had been successful in getting the refuse collection improved so that over Christmas, New Year and Easter there would be a collection each week and villages would no longer have a two week gap.

Storm Damage - Storms on Sunday October 27th brought down cables in Fen Road, damaged many trees and also took roof tiles off some homes.

Coles Road Flooding - Workmen have once again tried to solve the problem of flooding at the junction of Coles Road with Cambridge Road.

A couple of years on and it was time for School. Not the village school for us, we had to walk to the main road to catch the bus that started its journey at Waterbeach. Tiny little vehicle it was and by the time it reached the farm gate, usually had a full capacity of passengers so, I more often than not was privileged to sit beside Fred the driver until we reached our centre of learning, the Milton Road Elementary School. Besides driving the bus, Fred also had control of the lever that caused the door to open and close. Almost one of the first things I learnt going to school was to keep ones hands in ones pockets when Fred started pulling on the lever as that door had an insatiable appetite for young fingers.

We were not the only children from Milton to attend this School. Quite a number accompanied us, including Iris Hall (Pearson), Joyce, Susie and their brother Albert Goodin, Vin Shipp, cousin of the Goodins, Harold Easy and Frank Hindle whose father was by now installed as the new Manager of the Sewage Farm. Eventually, we all got bicycles and made our way to School, thus saving much needed cash for Mother. I mentioned the arrival of the Hindles at the Sewage Farm, well this was followed a year or so later by the replacement of the Pettits by the Lucas family. Three boys and a girl. All the boys, Steven, Peter and Arthur were keen on football and cricket which suited me fine although Arthur was only useful as a goalpost at first, being about five years of age at the time! In due time all of them played an active part in Milton village life. Their sister Phyllis, along with my sister joined the newly formed Guide Movement under the Leadership, I think, of a Miss Honey and Miss Amy Butcher, daughter of the Village Blacksmith. to be continued

Those were the days Last episode - continued from the October Issue

Yes, I too have enjoyed Geoffrey Benton's memories in the Beach News of Waterbeach in the 30's and 40's, in fact it was those stories which prompted me to write about my working days in service with the Waterbeach doctor and his family. There were all sorts of things that I could have written about but it would have been too repetitive.

When I look back I realise now how little I knew of life. Maybe these days they know too much, but I wish I had known a bit more, as I suffered a lot through lack of knowledge. Things happened to me that, had I told my employer, I would have been accused of making it up, so I thought it best to keep it to myself

When war started in 1939 I was expected to join the Red Cross, then become a blood donor, which ended when I became too old after seventy-two donations

The years 1935 to 1945 are still very vivid in my memory and things still happen now which remind me of those days. I still have the order of service for the closing of the Carmelite convent in 1937 and I remember delivering their medicines and speaking through a turntable in the wall. It was a bit weird and scary! One of my duties at the surgery that I hated was having to lock the waiting room door at 7 o'clock to stop anyone else coming in.

Looking back now, at the age of fourteen I was plunged into an unknown world without knowing anything of life, with no money or having had any social life at all; it was nothing but work, work, work and I was quite unhappy for a long time.

From my employers point of view I must have seemed such a simple creature, like taking on another child but to be fair to them, I had a good bed and was always

On the positive side my early days at work taught me discipline and not to be afraid of hard work, attributes which I found useful as I grew up. One of the highlights of my life was being presented with Maundy money from HM the Queen at Ely in 1987, something that I shall always remember. This concludes my series of writings for 'Beach News' which I hope have been of interest to readers.

'Exposed by the Trowel'

An important product of the land in fenedge Milton during the Roman occupation was as today, the growing of grain. In order to transport the grain either by road, river or canal (the Car Dyke, see June 2002 issue), the grain needed to be kept dry, vermin free and relatively manageable weight. by These requirements were satisfied by large storage jars being fired from local gault clay, primarily at pottery works in Horningsea. This distinctive Horningsea ware was over half an inch thick, and two feet high with a large open neck; the greatest diameter of the jar was around twenty one inches and the base eleven inches wide, the jar was decorated with a comb pattern. Such a large jar could hold well over a hundredweight of grain and it is estimated that up to 20 jars (over a ton of grain) could be placed on a 15 feet x 6 feet boat for transporting along the Cam or the Car Dyke to the North.

But Horningsea was not alone in producing 'commercial' and domestic pottery in our region. Our past local historian Ken Humphries reported in 1970 on Milton's contribution to Romano-British pottery. Although less grand than the Horningsea ware, Milton kilns, some on the site of the present Country Park, produced grain jars around 15 inches high with open necks 10-12 inches in diameter. Furthermore, a range of domestic pottery of various shades - red, grey through to black and textures either coarse or fine, was being made in a number of kilns around Milton. These kilns and evidence for industrious 'Miltonians' living nearby during between the 1st and 5th Centuries AD will be the topic of my next article. In the meantime, just check those bits of pot in the rose beds, your ancestors may have thrown these on a wheel 1800 years ago if you think this, contact Jim Daniels, Tel/Fax 861447 or E-mail:

Funding Future Facilities in Milton

There was an interesting joint meeting of the parish council and the charity which runs the community centre and the recreation grounds at the start of November. Two main issues were discussed.


The first is a project to virtually re-build the pavilion on Sycamores Rec, both to provide better facilities for the cricket and football clubs (the "colts" end of which is booming: there are over 200 youngsters playing football now for example, both boys and girls) and to provide a permanent home for the youth club (currently in a portakabin next to the pavilion). It's hoped that most of this development (in the order of £300,000) will be funded by external funders (lottery etc), commercial sponsors and by fund raising by the clubs although the parish council will probably be asked to make some contribution.

The second project, on a slightly longer timescale, is work to improve and expand the community centre on Coles Road. This was purchased via a loan from the Government which will be paid off in just under three years. The current proposal is to take out another loan at that time with similar re-payment terms and use that to fund improvements to the building.

What exactly will be done to the community centre is still being discussed. The cladding on the outside of the building certainly needs replacing at the bottom. Other items on the wish list include: - extending the annexe, - improved changing rooms, possibly with their own access to the recreation ground, - a bigger admin office, - an office for the parish council, - a new structure joining the main community centre and the annexe together.

Parish Council Finances 2001 - 2003



During 2001/02 Milton Parish Council spent a total of £88,547. The chart shows broadly how this money was spent. The Parish Council continues to support the many sporting, social and leisure activities at the community centre and recreation grounds through its grant of £20,000. Total income for the year was £92,339.

Budget figures for 2002/03 show an estimated expenditure of £87,536.

The Parish Council has received £69,000 from the Parish's share of the Council Tax for 2002/03. This means that a 'Band D' house is paying £42.41, an increase of 3.5% from last year.
