

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Historians map out who lived where in Milton




Graham Easy and Roger Day with some of the drawings of Milton streets and the listings of past occupants

Ken Humphries lived in a rambling old house in Butt Lane until he died in the early 1980s. Kens Way was built where the old house once stood

Ken was a keen historian and in his time had been the Parish Clerk for Milton and District Councillor. He was well known for his interest in Milton village history. During his lifetime he recorded a great deal of information on the village and one project he started was compiling a list of homes in the old part of the village and listing those who had lived there. He involved Harold Easy in this project who in turn involved Graham Easy. Graham has now almost completed his research with the help of Roger Day in particular, and many local people. An example of his careful drawings of Milton homes can be seen above. Graham, over the years, has amassed a library of hundreds of Milton family trees all hand written, some with photographs. Milton Village View will be publishing shortly his complete work on village homes, and who lived there over the last century, (for final corrections before being used in the History of Milton Book, which we hope to produce at a later stage.) A14 Bridge

Mowlem plc are pleased and excited to have been awarded the contract to build this landmark bridge. We will endeavour to keep all interested parties informed of progress of the works both off and on site and will shortly launch a dedicated website that can be linked from

Work has already started. Preliminary orders for steelwork have been placed and the production of fabrication drawings is underway. In the coming months the method of installation will be developed and approved by the Highways Agency. Fabrication of the bridge in Yorkshire will start around April this year with work on site planned to commence after Easter. Installation of the central span is planned to take place during a total closure of the A14 on the weekend of the 13/14th September. Andrew Kenyon

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MILTON 2000 - MINUS A YEAR OR TWO

By Harry Missing - continued from October issue

I mentioned earlier, the workers on the Farm came mainly from Chesterton. I think all those who saw active service in the First World War returned safely. Two, I remember, the Smith brothers Sammy and Bill nearly always wore items of army clothing. Billy, a Greatcoat and Sammy, long Puttees. The Puttee, I believe, was first introduced by the Army as a safeguard for soldiers serving overseas, from Snake Bite. It was not, therefore inappropriate that Sammy should wear them on the farm, where I swear most of the snake population of the County were accommodated! You will gather from this that I hated them. It seemed, every time I went Black-berrying, but only after I had a full basket, one would cross my path. Up in the air would go my harvest of berries but before they reached the ground I would have already negotiated a couple of hedges and a three strand barbed wire fence on my way back to Mother. The darn things used even to come into the house – how I hated them, still do.

We, even as children, called all the men by their Christian names, except one who we respectfully referred to by his surname, Mr Mansfield. This respect stemmed from the fact that unlike the other men, he was always clean shaven and smartly dressed. He never seemed to get involved in the dirtier jobs on the farm, doing such things as thatching, of which he was well skilled, hedge cutting and hand hoeing. Later in life I was told by my brother that this 'upgrading' if you like, came from the fact that he owned his own house on the Milton Road, between King's Hedges and Arbury Road, a most unusual achievement for a farm labourer. Apparently when the Cambridge Building Society, of which you now have a Branch in the village, came into existence, the Society decided that the fairest way of distributing their then limited funds was by way of a raffle and, I was told, Mr Mansfield was the first winner.

Unless one specialised in a particular branch of farm work such as that of Bill Smith, who looked after the Pigs and breeding Cows, the men worked in pairs or larger groups. Father of course looked after the horses along with an assistant, Ernie Gauthrup, who cycled daily from his home in Girton. Between them they did all the ploughing, drilling, reaping etc., as by this time, 1927, Brother Ernie had already left the farm, set up a haulage business, married a Milton girl, of course and was living in Landbeach.

A little earlier, before his marriage, my brother had decided to purchase a Crystal Set. This magical box would allow you, with a little bit of good fortune in your tickling of the crystal, to hear sounds from as far away as London. Mother, of course, immediately objected to it, saying she was not going to have any of the Devils instruments in her house. By now Ernie had reached that age when bravery and rebellion combined and so the devil took up residence, showing to the outside world his presence by the aerial waving in the wind between the house and the Cowshed. Between us we spent many hours tickling that crystal, more in hope than expectation. Mother however, stuck to her guns and would not go near it. That is until one Sunday night when my brother managed to get the church service from St Martins in the Fields. "Listen to this mother", Ernie said. Mother listened and started to wave her arms in time with the hymn singing. The 'Old Devil' had won and we all had difficulty from then on to get our turn to tickle the crystal!

Soon after this, a switch was made in the Breed of horse used on the farm. Out went the heavy Shires to be replaced by Suffolk Punches. The replacement included three Stallions and as a result a breeding programme was set up. Besides home breeding, Father used to walk with an Entire as far as Burwell, calling at farms on the way at Quy and the Swaffhams. This meant he was away for several days at a time, staying at the various farms he visited. In August last year, 2001, I was invited to a Wedding in my present home village of Sproughton in Suffolk where I met a gentleman who was responsible for maintaining all registrations for the Suffolk Horse Society. We talked and he promised to look up his Stud Books and send me the results of his search. True to his word, a few days later I received extracts that showed the names of five mares all with names prefixed by the word 'Milton'. I realised these were all the foals my sister and I had been taken into the stables to see within an hour or so of their birth. The village, therefore, can perhaps take some pride in this association with such an esteemed Horse Society.

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




Thank you Harry

Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award in Milton??

The Duke of Edinburgh Award is a programme which is "A balanced, non-competitive programme which encourages responsibility, self-reliance, personal discovery and perseverance". There are 4 sections to completing the Award: The first 3 are Service, Skill and Physical and participants are required to spend 3 months on each of these sections completing roughly an hour a week of voluntary activity.

The last section is the expedition section which is the main focus of meetings as we train up to do a weekend expedition where participants walk 15 miles over 2 days and camp out overnight.

I have been running the Bronze Award for the past year at Impington Village College. However if there is local interest it would be nice to start up a local group as part of our youth work in Milton. We are looking for young people who are aged 14 or over and we also will need some adult volunteers.

Volunteers would benefit from having some walking experience and scouting/guide experience is very useful too.

Exposed by the Trowel

The Romans, like the prehistoric peoples before them, and others since, realized that the gravel terraces (fen edge) to the west of the River Cam at Milton, were above the flood plain and the climate generally was not extreme. This convinced the Romans that this was a conducive place to live as well as work with the help of course of some British slaves, let us take a look at the archaeological evidence for this.


First, we return to fields south of Butt Lane which in the last 5 years have been scoured out as an extension to the land fill site. In the mid 1990's before this encroachment of the landscape, rescue archaeological excavations revealed evidence for an active Romano-British farm estate on this site. Significant features were a timber barn, corn drier, smithy, oven and various ceramic and metal objects related to farming and domestic life between the 2nd and 4th Centuries. A notable find was a cemetery mound containing three 2nd Century cremations, one of which was in a box with two small wine flagons, each spoiled with a hole (ritual significance). Around these relics were nineteen skeletons dating to the 3rd and 4th Centuries.

Land to the northeast of the village on the gravel terrace within the proposed rowing course, was also occupied by Romano-British farmers between the 2nd and 4th Centuries. Evidence for industrial and domestic activity includes Horningsea ware pottery kilns and features reflecting cereal processing and animal husbandry; inhumation cemeteries have also been found. However, any of us could find an artefact of the Roman period away from the two areas mentioned. A Roman lead figurine of an emperor, beads and pottery sherds were found near the Old School Lane entrance to the Country Park, and a Roman knife beneath a calf s skull was found during gravel extraction in the northeast area of the present Country Park. 
