

Delay leads to new date for closure of A14

The A14 is not now due to close for work during September. The new cycle footbridge is now expected to be wheeled into position in late October / beginning of November. A new date is being sought currently that will not clash with events such as the Duxford Air show. The weekend of 24th October is a date that is under consideration. Look out for information - signs will be positioned around the county warning of the closure and there will be notices in the press etc.

The bridge will be wheeled into position overnight, possibly starting well after midnight, on the first day of closure but works will continue during Saturday and Sunday to secure the structure.



Although complaints have dropped the problems have not all gone away so please continue to complain when you have cause otherwise Cambridge Water will believe there is no longer a problem.

Under-age drinking of alcohol is causing problems in Milton and Waterbeach. Invariably this results in anti-social behaviour, vandalism and continuing incidents of broken glass being found in play areas reserved for children. If you have any information regarding these or any other offences in the area please call PC Phil Shulver at Histon Police Station.

Do you have teenage children, between the age's 16-18 years? If so, they can apply through their school for a free card which proves their age. If the young person is no longer in education, he/she can still apply by completing an application form. The scheme is run by Cambridgeshire Trading Standards, in partnership with other agencies. Its aim is to assist retailers in ensuring that certain goods - for example alcohol, are not sold to young people who are too young to make those purchases. You can obtain an application form from Trading Standards on 0845 3030666; alternatively contact Julie Gilbert at Histon Police Station.

Milton 1900 to Modern Times: part 2







MILTON 2000 - MINUS A YEAR OR TWO BY HARRY MISSING Continued from June Issue

Deviating again, but still talking about Foxes, Father once told me, when he was quite young, before he came to Milton, he was working in this field which had a very large, old Hawthorn hedge on one side. The hedge had recently been cut down to about 2ft from the ground. On this particular day the Horse and Hounds operating in the adjacent fields had 'put up' and were chasing a Fox towards the field in which Father was at work. On reaching the edge of the field, the Fox jumped up onto the hedge stumps and started to run down its length. The hounds on reaching the hedge immediately started to run around in circles having completely lost the scent. Meanwhile the Fox having reached the end of the field and hedge, jumped down, looked back at the hounds and appeared to smile before calmly trotting off into the next field to safety. Another incredible story of nature and animal survival. Other sources of food were available, particularly from the 1st of September when the first day for Partridge shooting came around. From my recollection, I never remembered ever seeing a Pheasant in Milton before the Second World War. There were plenty the

From my recollection, I never remembered ever seeing a Pheasant in Milton before the Second World War. There were plenty the other side of the river in the Quy/Lode areas and I often wondered if they disliked flying over water or simply didn't like travelling too far from their place of hatch. To this day, I have never tasted one. After the war all this changed with Pheasants being reared by a Mr Farrow, who had a Butchers Shop at the bottom of Milton Road, on land now occupied by the slip road and Tesco's Car Park. I believe, a number of birds are now in residence this side of the river.

Life, though isolated at times perhaps by snow drifting up the hedge beside the farm road, was never dull and some incidents were quite exciting. The burning down of the Railway Crossing Keepers black wooden house, the loss by fire of one straw stack and the burning of the now disused Sheep Rick, particularly frightening for Mother and I as we were inside the compound at the time 'dragging' carpets in the long grass to spring clean them. With our uninterrupted view over to the Gogs and Nine Mile Hill (junction of A11/A14) we had wonderful view of passing Airships, including the R34, R100 and the ill-fated R101. They were so low and flew so slowly, I'm sure my catapult would have reached them! Later, flying at not much greater speed, came a number of large, black, sinister looking Bombers, probably of Avro or Armstrong Whitworth vintage, all following the same course. Recently I asked myself the question as to why we at the farm had been privileged to such a grandstand view of these craft – this happened on a number of occasions – so taking a map and placing a ruler on Cardington in Bedfordshire and the other end on Mildenhall, sure enough, it passed straight through the field in front of the farmhouse. Mildenhall, as you may know was the place where before the Second World War, we took all our Air Defence Craft for display to our future adversaries to show them just how inadequate they were. Cardington, as most will know, was the base for the Airships.


