When the Milton branch of the British Legion was first formed it was held in the Wash-house of Milton Hall when Major and Mrs Bulteel were in residence. I remember when I was a child attending these meetings and my Uncle singing "The hat my Father wore" and my mother singing "Annie Laurie" - they were not exactly Pavarotti or Joan Sutherland, but they enjoyed it.


Then, in 1933 a new hall was built as a new meeting place for British Legion members, and the opening was celebrated by a big parade with banners and a service in All Saints Church. The hall was also used for weddings, parties, and every Friday evening there would be a Whist Drive.

On remembrance Sunday there would be a service round the memorial and a Church Service, followed by refreshments in the Hall, and the proceeds collected for the Poppy Appeal would be counted.

In the last few years the hall was known as the Lion and Lamb function room, but to old Miltonians it will always be remembered as the old British Legion hall.

Now, the Hall is no more. It was a sad day and we mourn its loss. In less than a week the building was demolished - gone forever, and with it many memories.

And all that remains of Milton British Legion are the two banners that stand in All Saints Church..... Mary Daniels


Where Have All The Photos Gone?

## **Playgroup Reunion**

This September our Playgroup was 25 years old. It was started by three ladies: Ruby and Wendy Stanley and Jill Pettitt, and ran with very few changes of staff for many years. Janet Freeman has worked there for nearly 25 years and started at the princely wage of 12/6d a morning! The teachers had to fight all their own battles over the years: they fundraised themselves, holding a jumble sale each year to finance buying the paper, paint, glue etc. and had to do quite a lot of the cleaning, too. There were plenty of customers of playgroup age until around 1984, when it became a PPA playgroup run by a committee of the parents: being a charity it could then apply for grants and call on its members to raise funds. At the lowest point we opened with only 13 children in September, but we have steadily grown since then, with the expansion of the village adding to the numbers of young children. The Playgroup is now flourishing - we have a bulging waiting list of children due to start years into the future. I wonder if Milton Playgroup will still be around in 25 years time, though?

We held a 25th birthday reunion on 26th September, at which playleaders from all the years came for a celebration together with committee members. In this fast-changing world it was reassuring to hear how similar the activities at playgroup had been so long ago. But we don't have

television at playgroup now. Wendy Stanley reminisced: 'In the middle of the morning we used to settle the children down to watch the television. There was only that one programme for young children in those days. They had their milk and lunch while they tried to guess which window we were going through today. The television often went fuzzy and we used to thump it on the top to clear the picture. The parents wondered what we were teaching the children, when they went home and hit their own television sets!

In September we had our inspection by the Under 8's Advisor from Histon social services team, for re-registration of the playgroup under the Children Act. This was a very detailed inspection of the premises, indoor and outdoor play facilities, health and safety aspects, the training of playleaders, the programme of activities and equipment available, records of the children's details and arrangements for emergencies, and the quality of the experience for the children. I have to say we passed with flying colours, and the Advisor said she would be sending other playgroup organisers to our playgroup to see how it should be done - we were one of the best she had seen, both in terms of the premises and the running of the playgroup, and the village should be proud of its playgroup. ## A TRIBUTE TO THE ROYAL NAVY

Another Remembrance Sunday has come and gone and the veterans of World War II who take part in the parades get older and older with the passing years. Their memories of those war years and the tales they tell of personal experiences will one day go with them and may be lost forever.

In Milton there are several men who served in the Royal Navy during the Second World War. My husband was one of them. I would especially like to give credit to the part they played to keep our country free from Nazi domination.

We celebrate The Battle of Britain and this year remembered The Battle of El Alamein, 50 years on. Next year it's the turn of the Royal Navy, to celebrate what is considered the most vital of all

campaigns in The War - "The Battle of

the Atlantic".

This naval battle against the U Boats in 1942-1943 is commonly regarded as the turning point in the struggle to protect the v i t a l



transatlantic lifeline, so nearly severed by Nazi U Boats in 1942. The campaign fought by the Royal Navy to win the "Battle of the Atlantic" was both fierce and protracted.

both fierce and protracted.
Without food supplies from North
America, the population of this country
would have starved in about three and

a half weeks - a grim thought.

The merchant ships in large convoys were protected sometimes by only two escorts at a time and suffered heavy casualties, until eventually the U Boats were scattered and many sunk by the Royal Navy, and the food was able to get through.

Next May in Liverpool "The Battle of the Atlantic" will be celebrated with a Fleet Review and a re-creation of a

Wartime Atlantic convoy.

There will be a commemorative service to mark the 50th Anniversary, in Liverpool's Anglican Cathedral.

From The Cambridge Chronicle 1895

CHRISTMAS AT MILTON - The children of the school to the number of 94, were given a tea and Christmas tree by Mr and Mrs Tweedale of Milton Hall. The tree reached from the floor to the ceiling and was loaded with dolls and toys and useful articles of wearing attire suitable for girls. The boys received gifts such as they would have chosen if the selection had been left to themselves. The delight of the children was intense and was shared by the company present, who evinced great pleasure at seeing the juveniles made so happy. The school was visited by numerous persons during the earlier part of the day, and loud were the praises of the mothers that their children should be encouraged to good behaviour by fits and a good treat such as had never been seen in Milton before Mr and Mrs Tweedale come to live at the Hall.

The company included visitors at the hall among whom were Mr and Mrs Burden, also the Misses Gunnell, Miss Maud Tebbit and Miss Honey. In addition to the useful articles, each child received a bun and an orange on leaving for home. The Master expresses thanks on behalf of the children and for himself and daughter, who received presents of special value from Mrs Tweedale. The National Anthem was sung and happy day ended amid loud hurrahs, accompanied by drums and cornet. Mr and Mrs Tweedale were well pleased with the arrangements and said everything had gone off reasonably well.

## CARE OF THE FRAIL, ELDERLY

There is no doubt that facilities for the frail, elderly in Milton are well below those provided in nearby villages. There is no Day Centre in Milton for their use and their is no sheltered housing. It is not even known how many Miltonians fall into this category.

For this reason, some 30 - 40 people met in the Community Centre at the end of

October to discuss ways in which the frail, elderly could be helped.

A small committee was formed to look into the provision of a Day Centre and to establish who would be likely to use it. A speaker from South Cambs. reported on Sheltered Housing and it was quite clear that the council has no plans to build this type of housing in Milton. The land is too expensive.

It is likely that a MOBILE WARDEN SCHEME will be set up and that

It is likely that a MOBILE WARDEN SCHEME will be set up and that Landbeach will also participate with Milton in this scheme. It will include a schedule of regular visits and the provision of personal alarms. A part-time warden will be needed and it is hoped that Milton Charities will help with the funding.

A letter from the Transport Department of the County Council confirmed that the Department could not justify the expense required to prevent vehicles using the Butt Lane junction to turn round.

Three measures will now be looked at:

1. Establishing a pedestrian crossing in the High Street or Cambridge Road

2. Narrowing of the A10 at the northern approach into the village.

3. Weight restriction signs.

The possibility of 20mph experiment through the village will also be considered.

## RE: THE DISPENSING OF MEDICINES TO PATIENTS AT THE MILTON SURGERY

A pharmacy opened in Tesco store, Milton on 21 September 1992. The practice had not been informed of their intention to open a pharmacy until August, when the notices appeared in the store itself.

Under the present regulations, the people affected are all patients of this practice who live within one mile of Tesco. The following are the effects it will have on

these patients.

As of 21 March 1993, the practice will not be allowed to sell or provide medicines on the National Health Service (NHS) to these patients at the surgery. The exception will be if a patient can prove hardship, in which case they should

contact the surgery and the receptionist will assist them.

As many people may know, Dr Draper has been away on sabbatical, to obtain a further qualification as a Member of the Faculty of Homoeopathy. Since his return many people have benefited from the use of these medicines. Unfortunately after 21 March 1993 the above regulations will apply to Homoeopathic as well as conventional medicines, so it will be difficult for people in Milton to obtain Homoeopathic medicines as the nearest pharmacy specialising solely in Homoeopathic medicines is in London. Consequently it will be almost impossible to treat acute conditions such as ear infections in children or gastro-enteritis, Homoeopathically.

The practice hopes that it can make the NHS see sense over the whole dispensing issue and to adhere to the patients charter which states that it is obliged to ensure

that the patients needs are met.

If patients in Milton feel that their needs include enjoying the full benefits of the therapeutic system of Homoeopathy (in addition to conventional medicines) under the NHS then it will be necessary for them to make strong representation to the FHSA (Vinery Road, Cambridge - phone 242731) and/or Member of Parliament. This is the situation at present, if there are any further developments we will let

our patients know in a future issue of the Milton

Village View.
