

Memories of Milton - by Ivor Gates

My maternal Grandfather and Grandmother were Charles and Lois Garner who lived in one of the pair of cottages opposite the Milton Laundry owned by the Goodin family. The other cottage (in the thirties) was occupied by the local policeman, a Mr Bullen and his wife and daughter, whose name was Frances, she was probably 6 - 8 years older than me and so would be about 80+ now.

Granddad and Grandma came to Milton from Littleport about 1901/2. I know this because my mother was the youngest of their three children and she was born in Littleport on 17/2/1901. For a time, and I think up to or during the first World War they ran the post office from the front room of their home, and apparently you can still make out the different brickwork which was replaced when the post box was taken out and the post office was moved down past the Waggon and Horses Pub. My mother grew up in Milton and actually worked in the Post Office until 1923 when she got married to a Cambridge lad, and moved right away, -- to Cambridge! Her job in the Post Office was taken over by Annie Conder whose family took over the post office and stores, and I remember it in the 30's as Conder's

I spent a great deal of time in Milton as a child in the thirties as I spent all my school holidays there as I was Granddad's favourite and he was my favourite!. At that time, around 1936 to 1940 he was the local postman and had a post round from Butt Lane towards Cambridge. He also had a

parcel of land, which he farmed on the Waterbeach Road. At 6-8 years old it seemed like a farm but I think it might have been between 8 - 10 acres. My ideal day then was to get up early and wait for Granddad to get back from the Post Office after collecting the letters to be delivered, and then go on his round with him. One of the first stops was in Butt Lane where lived a Mrs Hopkins, whose daughter lived in Switzerland and Granddad go on his round with him. One of the first stops was in Butt Lane where fived a Mrs Hopkins, whose daughter fived in Switzerland and Granddad would always ask for the foreign stamps for me for my collection. In passing is there any memory in Milton of a Billy Wakefield who lived at the far end of Butt Lane, was quite a character and had a greengrocers round which he did with a horse and cart and used to come to the Arbury Road area of Cambridge. We would then come along the High Street towards Cambridge with our deliveries past the water pump where Granddad had to go twice each day to get water, as he had no water laid on, (or electricity or drainage) and I remember the Garage on the left coming out of Milton run by a Mr Butler, whose son I think was named John. Next door to that was a small shop run by Mrs Bell? From then on the properties got very sparse and we used to call at the Sewage farm and some two or three bungalows on the other side of the road. The next stop was at the railway level crossing where the crossing keeper, Charlie Carter always had a cup of tea waiting. Then on to King's Hedges Road for two cottages on the east side of the railway line at the far end of the road. There was also one cottage further in the wood down a track which Granddad used to 'service' once a week during the football coupon season. I presume they were then outside the Cambridge boundary. After that back to Milton and a mandatory? stop at the Lion and Lamb run by a man named Bert Tyrell. It was by then just after 10.00 am so beer for Granddad and lemonade for me. I think in those days even going in a pub aged 8 was illegal and frowned upon.

I do remember the old cycle shop in the centre of the village and I seem to remember Granddad taking his horse to the blacksmith there on at least

Does anyone remember a little old man, whose name I can't remember, but who lived just in Fen Road and whose 'party piece' was to make a sound like a violin! He came round to Granddad's on two or three occasions whilst I was there.

To complete our family records my mother had a brother and a sister. The sister married and lived in Cambridge, and her daughter, Josie, is now 82 living in Royston, and has done a lot of research on family history. I do not think it would help you on Milton matters, but I will be contacting her and will tell her of you and she might have some memories she could share with you.

Mother's brother Herbert, at one time lived in the 'gatehouse' to Milton Hall, on the Waterbeach Road when he was a chauffeur to Canon Evans from Ely Cathedral and I think this was in the late 20's early thirties.

If you're still reading, you're probably in the Eric Morecambe state by now - RUBBISH!

Just to finish am I right in saying that the Burling family were milkmen? How good is my memory really?

Old Times Remembered


In April, Harry Capitain returned to his old World War Two haunts on the island of Malta. Accompanied by Doug Teeboon, he attended several official receptions and memorial events during a two week stay. This included a visit to the presidential palace and an ANZAC evening at Valletta's Royal British Legion (see photo). Arranged by the George Cross Island Association the annual veterans' reunion has been attended many times by ex Royal Navy 'sparks' Harry. However, this year's trip was extra special as Doug was able to visit long lost relatives on the island.

"During the 3 year Siege of Malta we learned to put up with the constant bombing; it was the near starvation conditions which were unbearable," Harry remembers. "One of the most incredible sights I have ever seen was that of the entire Italian fleet surrendering to a small Royal Navy launch outside Grand Harbour," he continued.


