Milton Asian Disaster Appeal

£14,000 raised so far

The appeal now stands at £13,989, and further contributions are still to be added. So far Milton has raised enough to send shelter to over 280 people What a fantastic response for a village with only 1,800 homes! Each Shelterbox costs £490 and contains a tent, water purification, sleeping bags, cooking equipment and many other items - all in one

box and enough for ten people to set up home.

The appeal was launched on New Years Eve and raised several thousands in the first few days. By Friday 7th January over £6,800 had already been donated. The first donation to come in was from the Milton Colts whose New Years Eve raffle in aid of the appeal

raised £255.

Donations of hundreds of new gifts and Christmas presents for the Bring and Buy, raffle, bottle stall and auction flooded in and by Friday, the day of the sale, there were so many gifts it took almost an hour to



Peoples generosity was astonishing. Every trestle table the Community Centre had in the hall was in use and laden with donated goods. The volunteers reported that buyers were handing over money for goods and donating their change.

ferry the goods using a team of estate cars and volunteers from the house in Coles Road to the Community Centre. By Saturday 8th January, one week after the appeal had been launched over £12,000 had been raised. A further clearance sale held at the school raised over £160.

All Saints Lunch Club

February 20th 1980 I am reliably informed was the original date it all began, by a lady who wrote in her diary "Lunch Club started Today?"; now here we

are in 2005 and still going strong.

Rev'd Fred Kilner decided it was time we had a lunch club for people living on their own. The only place available for such a venture was the Old Rectory dinning room, now of course the Children's Hospice. The food was cooked in the Aga cooker and the helpers were Audrey Eubank, Rhoda Waters and Natalie Waterson, tables were laid by John Eubank and John Hudson. There were 12 to 15 people at this first lunch.

It had been going for fifteen months, when the Rector had his eye on a member of the congregation, who was due for retirement, to help out. The person in question decided that wasn't what she had in mind for retirement, but he persuaded her to give it a try, and here she is twenty three years later still giving it a try, and has just about got the

hang of it now!!!

The cost of the lunch then was 40 pence, which just about covered the cost, bearing in mind there were no overheads and it was non-profit making no wages to be paid. We managed this way for quite a time it was a challenge, but something that I thrive on.

In the meantime another challenge was looming on the horizon in the shape of a Church Hall. After many meetings, problems, prayers and lots of voluntary labour the building came into being and on October 18th 1984 the first lunch was held in the new Church Hall. We invited our MP Sir Francis Pym who was escorted by a detective, a necessity caused by the bombing at the Tory party conference at Brighton.

Milton 2000 minus a year or two - by Harry Missing (continued from Dec. issue) Returning to Condor's Shop, now the Village Post Office, it was run by Mrs Condor and her daughter Annie. Annie was the Postmistress but supported her now ageing mother in the shop. The shop was very small and dark with a brick floor. Goods were often housed in the numerous small drawers that lined the back of the counter. With no electricity, a candle was used to see into those dark areas when need arose. Unfortunately the candle had this instinct when it was unlit, to wander and customers and the village generally became accustomed to hearing the phrase, "Annie, where's the Candle?" I opened my first Post Office Savings Book there in 1935 with the £6.00 my grandfather had left me — I'm told the F.T. Index rose sharply that day!

On our journey down the High Street we would have had to have passed the village pond. Not ideal as the water was static and I think part of the drainage system from the North-west of the village and then on its way underground along the Fen Road to the river. It was bounded on the main road side by a low brick wall, open at each end to allow horse and carts to enter to be cleaned. Being on the bend in the road, it was, of course, very receptive of any stranger travelling towards Ely, particularly on one of

those exceptionally foggy nights we experienced before the war.

The Blacksmith's Shop stood opposite alongside the Village Pump and Jack Starling's Cycle Shop. It was here too that a number of the more senior gentlemen of the village would gather on a summers evening to discuss the happenings of the day and to put the world to rights. Not with a great deal of success, I might add, as they would be back again the next day to repeat the process. At least it can be said they did have 'time to stand and stare' in those less stressful days.

Report on the 2004 Season

Won 8 Lost 3 Played 11 League position: 1st equal

The Milton Under 15 season produced an amazing series of close finishes with five of the eight league matches still in the balance as the last few balls began. It was a tribute to the team's ability to cope with the pressure that in four cases the match was decided in Milton's favour while, in the defeat against league winners Thurlow, the outcome was only decided in a most unlucky manner when, with four runs needed for victory, the last man was given out stumped under the impression the ball was dead. The result effectively cost Milton the league title outright although a shared championship was still achieved despite a poor performance and 5

wicket defeat against in the return match against Shelford.

The first league match against Wilbrahams was remarkable.

Lacking 8 regular players and forced to call in four debutants from the under 13s, all of whom played their part well in the field, Milton won by 6 runs after amassing a season's best of 152. A brilliant 46 by Ciaran O'Kane was the highlight. The result presented an unexpected and baffling reversal of the crushing win by Wilbrahams in the Cup a fortnight earlier. There was also a phenomenal innings by Ryan Carey of 57 not out (well supported

Shelford match – the pair took us from 57 for 8 to the required target of 115 in 9 overs. Carey also scored 71 not out the next week in the second and crushing win over a weakened Wilbrahams.

The final game against NCI produced the most astonishing finish of all. Needing 4 to win off the final over the last wicket pair of Robert Jervis and Rob Welton were gifted two wides before Jervis swung high and straight to the long leg fielder on the boundary, who could not quite cling on and spilled the ball over the boundary to give Milton a one wicket run and hence, a share of the league title. The Cup quarter final defeat at the hands of Wilbrahams followed big wins in the earlier rounds against Fordham and Burwell, the latter of which featured 51 not out by James Henderson.

The batting was a little variable but showed a considerable depth, which stood us in good stead several times. Sam Allen and Michael Franklin showed good technique and often helped to see off the better bowlers, Ryan Carey, James Henderson, Nick Seaman and Ciaran O'Kane could all hit the ball hard and all produced at least one score of 40 or more and there were useful contributions from Jack Franklin (who, with Michael and Sam Allen shared the wicket keeping duties), Jim Reynolds, Simon Coston (with two particularly valiant efforts in the league defeats), Adam Coles, Rob Jervis and Robbie Welton.
Fielding and running between the wickets both left something to be desired. Carey took some very fine catches at short cover, and

Michael Franklin was an alert wicket-keeper; Jack Franklin and Sam Allen both deputised capably.

Rob Jervis was the leading wicket-taker with several good performances, notably against Thurlow at home and Wilbrahams away when he was almost unplayable in taking 4 for 7. Seaman was the most economical, and Simon Coston produced good variety with his spin. Ryan Carey, Adam Coles, James Henderson, Tom Fenner, Jack Franklin, John Underwood, Freddie Steele and Tom Linstead all contributed two wicket performances on at least one occasion. In general line bowled was rarely good enough, and there were a ridiculous number of wides at times. This reflected the age old tendency to
