#### CRIME IN THE VILLAGE

Do you know what the recorded crime

is in our Village?

The statistics for October, November and December 1992 show that there were 14 burglaries; 16 motor vehicles stolen; 25 offences of theft, (18 involved theft from motor vehicles) and 6 offences of criminal damage: 61 incidents in total.

As a comparison, Milton has marginally less crime than other villages; e.g., Cottenham, for the same period, had 77 incidents. There were no cases of violence or assault in Milton. The community can help themselves and the local Police by being vigilant and reporting immediately suspicious incidents to the Police.

#### LITTLE 'ODE' ON NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

It started up in Mollington in 1982 A village suffering so much crime Whatever could it do?

There was a scheme they'd heard about No new idea its true Neighbourhood Watch they call it The Police support it too.

The need to be aware of crime in your locality To make your home that more secure and mark all property

There's door and window stickers And Street sign to display These tell the thief the Neighbourhood Is one where crime won't pay.

#### NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Neighbourhood Watch is no new idea of course. Long before the founding of the Police Service people did band together in order to protect themselves and their property from the criminal element of Society.

With the gradual breakdown of traditional family life and the erosion of community responsibility and 'spirit' people have been content in their busy lives to see crime as the problem for the Police.

Crime affects us all, endeavouring to prevent crime and by reducing peoples fear of crime we will undoubtedly make our communities a lot safer place in

which to live.

Neighbourhood Watch is then simply an attempt at re-kindling that community spirit making people aware of local crime and encouraging them to report suspicions and to take

measures in order to avoid falling the victims of crime themselves.

Neighbourhood Watch was started in the USA in 1968. The idea was very successful, bringing communities together and a closer relationship between residents and the Police. In 1982 the first scheme to be set up in Britain was in the village of Mollington, Cheshire. Such was its success that schemes have since been adopted nation-wide.

Many communities particularly in rural areas already have to some greater or lesser extent a 'community base' on which to build a successful Neighbourhood

Watch.

The adoption of schemes within the Cambridgeshire Police area began in 1986 and there are currently 254 schemes in South and East Cambridgeshire Districts. 56 of these schemes involve entire villages.

I would like to stress that the formation of a scheme is easy, it is in maintaining commitment and enthusiasm that the problem lies, for when there appears to be little crime going on in a neighbourhood, complacency sets in, the guard drops and crime rears its head again.

An added inducement to residents thinking of forming a scheme is now often provided by insurers who may offer discounts on household contents premiums for members of Police recognised schemes.



**Charity Collections** 

A lot of money is given to charities in this village every year. House to house collections has been the favourite method and several annual collections have a long history here because of the enthusiasm and devotion of local organisers. However, things are changing. The work that charities do does not become any less necessary, but costs rise and getting money in gets harder. Finding organisers and collectors seem to get harder too and the charities are resorting to telephone canvassing, they ask for blanket permission to collect between certain dates and then from electoral roles start calling individuals and ask them to collect in their neighbourhood. At local level what this means is a rush of collections in late spring and early autumn, taking advantage of longer daylight hours, fair weather and avoiding holiday periods. The collectors have no choice but to collect when they are told to for fear of breaking the law.

In one month last year there were six collections.

Why don't they organise it better? When local police gave permission for local collections they knew who was doing what when. Now that the big charities fix their collecting periods nationally every week of the year is used several times over. Telephone canvassing makes things because it cuts across any local arrangements.

If you organise a local collection please

contact the Village View with details of dates. It would also be interesting to know how much money is collected. Let us give them all a decent chance without annoying the generous givers in the community.

#### **ROYAL BRITISH LEGION**

In a previous Village View the R.B.L. emblem was referred to as a banner. It is NOT. It is a STANDARD and should be looked upon as a rallying point and symbol of all the Legion stands for.

The Blue and Gold of the Emblem - to remind us of all those who served in the air and on or under the sea. The Gold to remind us of all who were tried by fire. Whether on sea, in the air, or on land, Soldiers, Doctors, Nurses, Civilians, etc.

In the Dexter corner, is the Union Jack - made up of the crosses of St George, St Andrew and St Patrick. The Emblem which stands for all that every Briton holds most dear.

On top of the 8ft 8in jointed pole is a spire. The cords round its base must always be level and is said to "bind all together". I proudly carried the Women's section standard for about 12 years and was accompanied by the men's section standard bearers - Mr Frank Burling and then Mr Lester Gray.

The two standards are now laid up in All Saints, as we have no branch in Milton now. Lester and I were so proud to be amongst over 400 standard bearers for the 50th Anniversary held on Newmarket Race Course on 20th July 1971.

The Rowing Lake

A progress report has been issued by the Trustees of the proposed Rowing Lake. Included in this report are the following:

The siting of the Lake is being looked at so as to avoid the necessity of diverting Fen Road.

The implications are being considered of digging the lake to a depth of 3.5 metres.

The Royal Engineers at Waterbeach are interested in the project because it will provide suitable training in bridge buildings and track laying.

An evaluation of the archaeological importance of this site is being carried out and Roman pottery remains have been found.

The proposed plans and objections by Milton Parish Council have been considered by the Secretary of State who has decided to leave the matter in the hands of South Cambs. District Council. This effectively means that the Trust has approval for their plan.

#### 1991 Census Profile Of Milton

The last count shows the population of Milton to be 3997 - 2014 males and 1983 females. In 1981 it was 1681 - so in 10 years the population has increased 2.5 times.

An Analysis of the age groups in Milton shows a comparitively young population:

Nearly half the residents are under 30.

There are 1613 households in Milton, so the average household size 2.48.

No less than 21% of the population lived at a different address 1 year ago thus reflecting the 'new village status of Milton.

Of the household characteristics, 45 residents lack or share a bath/shower/WC and 186 do not have central heating.

186 households do not have a car, 804 have 1 car and 626 have 2 or more cars - (and so many of these are parked in the street it is not surprising that the village resembles a huge car park).

1277 of the residents are owner occupied. There are 717 detached houses, 476 semi-detached, 271 terraced houses and 130 purpose built flats.

terraced houses and 130 purpose built flats.

In 1991 there were 2453 people over the age of 16 economically active (ie at work) 1368 males and 1085 females whilst 104 were unemployed - this represents 4.2% of the population aged over 16 years.

#### **DOWN YOUR WAY**

Many of the Milton roads are named after prominent villagers of the past and here are a few more examples.

WILSON WAY - Up until the late 1960's there was a seed and corn shop in the High Street owned by the Co-op. It was located where the chalet style houses now are, between the White Horse and the shops. The Manager of this shop was Fred Wilson and Wilson Way is named after him.

KNIGHTS WAY - Samuel Knight was Rector of Milton in the 18th Century and was responsible for the building of Milton Hall in the 1740's. For many years Milton Hall was the home of the Rectors of Milton. The owners of the Hall held the Manorial rights of Milton until they were extinguished in the 1930's. Knights Way is named after Samuel Knight.

GUNNELLS CLOSE - The Gunnell family can be traced back about 250 years in Milton. They were mainly farmers and for many years their farm was Willow Farm - the site of what is now Willow Crescent. The last members of the family to live in the village were two sisters, who were also the last to hold the Manorial rights of the village. The graves of members of the Gunnell family can be seen in the churchyard.

In the last issue of the Village View reference was made to the Nursery run by Eric Walkling. The origins of this business in fact go back to the 19th Century when it was founded by Mrs Passingham. The first record of the Passingham family in Milton appears in the 1871 Census.

#### Milton's Champion Indoor Bowls Player


