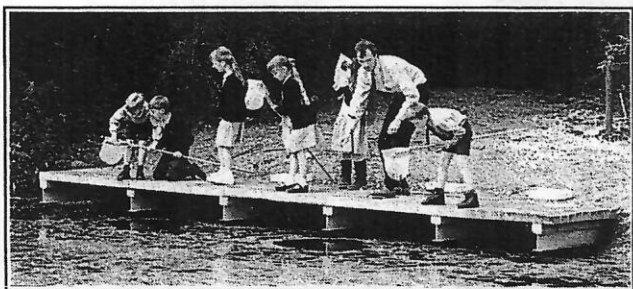

Now the Park is full of plants, trees and wildlife and gives access to those in wheelchairs as well as cyclists, walkers, horse riders and responsible dog owners. The lakes which are generally very deep attract many types of birds including Great Crested Grebes. On the centre lake there is a floating sculpture, designed by Peter Fluck of Spitting Image fame.

Other facilities available include Visitors Centre with a shop run by the Wildlife Trust, play equipment, parking and toilets. The District Council has now provided this park at a cost of £1.2 million pounds, less than half the cost originally anticipated all thanks to the hard work of the Council and the working party which included our own District Councillor Jim Fisher.

Milton Country Park Official Opening

At last the 85 acres of Milton Country Park with over two miles of winding footpaths is officially open.

The park, which has been planned for over 20 years was originally gravel pits which were excavated between 1930 and 1960. During this time the site revealed some interesting evidence of earlier inhabitants, possibly Romano British settlers and included skeletons, beads and domestic pottery.

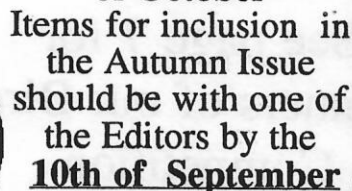

Dog Fouling

(Information sent to Parish Councils from South Cambridgeshire District Council)

A by-law is in force in this District under which it is an offence for a person in charge of a dog to allow it to foul a footpath adjacent to the public highway or a grass verge not more than four metres wide adjoining such a footpath, provided there are adequate signs giving this information.

The District Council are seeking the help of the public with complaints of dog fouling in contravention of the by-law and are asking them to identify the dog owners causing the problem and to keep a log of any incidents.

Where there is sufficient evidence and someone to bear witness in Court as to the facts The District Council will actively consider bringing a prosecution.

FUND-RAISING MARATHON

FOR THE CHILDREN'S HOSPICE

Keen Milton walker David Waterson (55) has given himself a year to complete a unique fund-raising marathon for the Children's Hospice.

David will have completed the equivalent of 15 Everests if he succeeds in his aim of climbing all of Scotland's 277 mountains over 3,000 feet by May 23-24.

So far he has toiled up more than 200 peaks on the Munro circuit, named after the Scottish Mountaineer, Sir Hugh Munro, of Kirriemuir, Perth, whose survey pinpointing all the summits involved was first published a century ago in 1892.

After spending 13 weeks in the Highlands since May 25 last year, David is now gearing himself up for the countdown on the most easterly Munro - appropriately enough called Mount Keen.

The adventure began working southwards from Ben Hope in the far north and since then David has walked more than 1,200 miles, climbed 330,000 feet and cycled more than 400 miles.

Friends and supporters are being invited to join him for a wee dram and champers to hopefully celebrate the successful completion of a lifetime's ambition.

A small ad hoc group is co-ordinating the fund-raising with David's wife, Beryl, of Cambridge Road, acting as manager of the enterprise. Pledges of sponsorship and support will be collected throughout the village in the next few months through a network of commercial and domestic sources.

IN MEMORIAM

ALBERT HAMS - 1903-1993

Born in 1903 Bert Hams died in Addenbrooke's Hospital on 30 April 1993. Bert came to Milton from London at the beginning of the 1940's to work on the railways in Cambridgeshire, and at the end of World War II he liked what he had seen and remained in Milton until his death. Everyone in Milton knew Bert, and he was a person with whom one could converse on politics, wildlife, horticulture, horse racing, greyhounds, and in fact, most any subject. Until the last year of his life Bert cultivated his garden in the grounds of the White Horse Public House, where he lived in his caravan amongst his prize quality chrysanthemums and vegetables. During the 1950's and 1960's Bert was the village postman and he carried out this duty entirely on his own.

To those of us who knew him, Bert appeared almost indestructible and we shall all miss him very much for a long time to come. In conclusion I would like, on behalf of all Bert's friends, to say a big thank you to Mary and Roy Strickland for the loving care and attention they gave to Bert for some considerable time and particularly during the last months and weeks of his life.

MILTON FC 1992-93

The whistle has finally blown on yet another season for Milton Football Club, a season which has had its 'highs' and 'lows' but which overall, has not been completely unsuccessful. Following last season's poor disciplinary record throughout the club, it is pleasing to report that the disciplinary points total has been reduced by almost 75%. The target must now surely be to achieve a 'pointless' season.

The highlight of the season was without doubt the performance of the 'A' team in reaching the final of the Reg Haigh Cup. A Splendid achievement which sadly did not have a fairy-tale finish. Against the unbeaten champions of Division 4b, our boys from Division 5b lost to an own goal in the last few minutes of extra time. However, to coin a well worn phrase 'they played out of their skins!'. They were indeed a credit to the increasing level of ability in the lower Divisions. The remainder of the season saw the 'A' team finish in third place with an outside chance of securing an additional promotion place.

Milton Reserves, freshly promoted from Division 4b, did more than hold their own and but for the need to support the first team and occasionally strengthen the 'A' side which left the squad slightly depleted on some occasions, they might well have been challenging for promotion once again. Indeed on one occasion, the reserve team defence comprised senior members of the club whose ages totalled in excess of 180. Having finished the season in equal fourth place promotion is clearly the target for next year. The club's First team did not truly show their capability consistently throughout the year and after brushing against the relegation zone, a five match winning run saw them finish in sixth place in Division 1b. Injury and unavailability ravaged the team on some Saturdays and given a consistent squad, promotion next season should be well within their capability.

When the 'A' team was instigated two years ago, the intention was to use the team to encourage and bring through the younger members of the club and this season we have seen several teenagers making their debut in the First and Reserve teams. The success of this measure will clearly benefit the club at all levels and we are all looking forward to next season with great confidence and more than a hint of expectation.

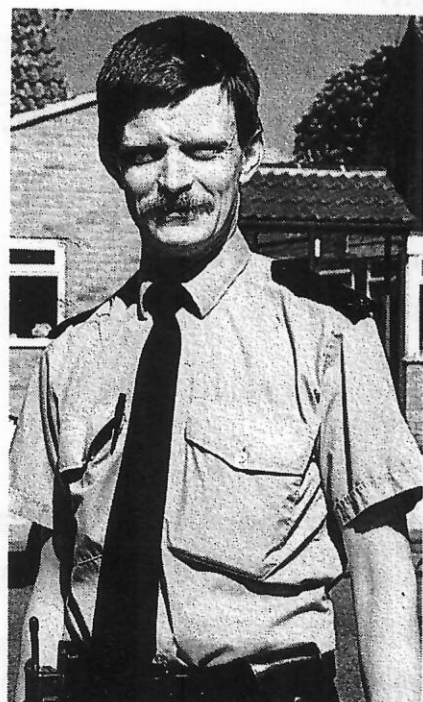

Did you know that last year there were 248 crimes in Milton and if the figures for the first three months of the year are anything to go by it will be no better this year. The statisticians tell me that Milton is no worse per head of population than any other village in South Cambridgeshire. Okay, so Milton appears to have an average crime rate, but that is not acceptable for me and I'm sure it isn't for you either.

So what can be done to reduce the Crime Rate?
